1. Welcome and Introductions

Teresa Villegas, Chair of the Upper Los Angeles River WASC, welcomed Committee Members and called the meeting to order.

CJ Caluag (District) facilitated the roll call of Committee Members. All committee members made self-introductions and a quorum was established. Paula Alvira (District) translated public comment instructions into Spanish for Spanish speaking attendees.

2. Approval of Meeting Minutes from June 2nd, 2021

The District facilitated a copy of the meeting minutes from the previous meeting. Patrick DeChellis motioned to approve the June 2, 2021 meeting minutes. Teresa Villegas seconded the motion.

The Committee voted to approve the June 2, 2021 meeting minutes. (Approved, see vote tracking sheet).

3. Committee Member and District Updates

CJ Caluag (District) provided the District updates, noting: Call for Projects Round 3 deadline is July 31, 2021. A Call for Projects Round 3 recorded information session and FAQ have been posted on the SCWP website. Updates to the project modules are now live.

Mike Antos (Stantec) announced that all 12 Watershed Coordinators (WC) will be meeting on June 21, 2021 for their first meeting to start work on their individual and shared SCWP goals.

4. Watershed Coordinator Updates



Carlos Moran (Council for Watershed Health) provided Watershed Coordinator updates, noting: They have executed their agreement and will be attending the WC onboarding meeting. The Council for Watershed Health does not have their Notice to Proceed but are currently working with the District to get their workplan and outstanding items approved. They have started work on their Strategic Outreach plan and look forward to receiving input from the WASC.

The District commented that the WC will be reaching out to Committee Members to get feedback on the Strategic Outreach and Engagement Plan and eventually present it to the WASC for approval.

5. Ex Parte Communication Disclosures

Miguel Luna noted that he is consultant for the North Hollywood Park and Valley Plaza Park Projects and will be abstaining from all discussion based on guidance from Los Angeles County Counsel.

Cathie Santo Domingo noted that Los Angeles Recreation and Parks and her staff have received emails regarding the North Hollywood Park Project. She stated that the emails were not all about Water Quality issues and that they also discussed the project's scope and features.

6. Public Comment Period

Paula Alvira (District) translated public comment instructions into Spanish for Spanish speaking attendees.

Charles Nelson (Pacoima Neighborhood Watch Captain) commented in support of the David M. Gonzales Recreation Center Stormwater Capture Project.

Frank Dalessandro (Community Sports Foundation) commented on behalf of a larger group in support of adding the roller hockey rink to the scope of the North Hollywood Park Project.

Melissa Faigeles Levitt (LACMTA) presented a policy paper from LA Metro regarding the SCWP partial funding guidelines. She commented that LACMTA submitted paperwork that would reduce their capital and O&M costs that was not passed on to the WASC.

Dr. Shahriar Eftekharzadeh (SEITec) commented on the EWMP and the high cost of the North Hollywood Park Project. He requested that the WASC not include the LADWP projects in the SIP and for further analysis.

Karina Andrade (EL ARCA, Inc.) commented on behalf of the Lincoln Park Neighborhood Green Streets Network in favor of Lincoln Park Project.

Jose Rodriguez (Deputy District Director, LA City Council District 1) commented on behalf of Councilman Gil Cedillo in support of the Lincoln Park Neighborhood Green Street Network Project.

Anna Adaco (Mujeres De La Tierra) commented in support of the Lincoln Park Neighborhood Green Street Network Project.

Luis Gonzalez (member of the Lincoln Heights community) commented in support of the Lincoln Park Neighborhood Green Street Network Project. His comments were in Spanish and the District translated them into English.

Luis Figueroa (Para Los Niños) commented in support of the Lincoln Park Neighborhood Green Street Network Project.



Natalie Torres-Soriano (Program Administrator, USC) commented in support of the Lincoln Park Neighborhood Green Street Network Project.

Tomas Benitez (Plaza de la Raza) commented in support of the Lincoln Park Neighborhood Green Street Network Project.

Felipe (SEA Program Coordinator) commented in support of the Lincoln Park Neighborhood Green Street Network Project.

Amanda Helguera (Alma Family Services) commented in support of the Lincoln Park Neighborhood Green Street Network Project.

Paola Bassignana (LA City Council District 7) commented on behalf of Councilwoman Monica Rodriguez in support of the David M. Gonzales Recreation Center Stormwater Capture Project.

7. Discussion Items

- a) Proposed Partial Funding Recommendation from June 2nd Meeting Update
- i) David M. Gonzales Recreation Center Stormwater Capture, Valley Plaza Park Stormwater Capture, and North Hollywood Park Stormwater Capture Projects (LADWP)

LADWP respectfully declined the partial funding form for the 3 LADWP projects. The LADWP projects should be considered as presented.

Delon Kwan asked the project proponent for details regarding the offer of 70% partial funding while keeping the same project scope. Peter Tonthat (LADWP) responded that they are limited to the amount they can spend for unit capture volume. Mr. Tonthat mentioned that LADWP would spend 50% and that the remaining 50% would be a good match from the SCWP. Mr. Tonthat noted that funding only 70% of their ask would leave a funding gap without reducing the scope of work.

Mr. Tonthat (LADWP) proposed that the ULAR WASC fund 100% of the ask for David M. Gonzales and Valley Plaza Park Projects, and pre-approve 70% partial funding for the North Hollywood Park Project and allow 3 years to execute the transfer agreement. The District responded that the WASC would have to resubmit a partial funding form to LADWP. Mike Antos commented that the delayed execution of a fund transfer agreements is not what was envisioned by the policies of the SCWP. Mr. Antos noted the WASC can choose to adopt the project with partial funding if they feel the applicant provided sufficient evidence that they can secure the remaining funds or the WASC can choose not to fund the projects and the applicant can reapply in 3 years when they secure additional funding.

Mr. Antos described that there are two ways for the project to get funding at this point. One is in regards to partial funding, that the project applicant is able to continue the project with reduced SCW funding and additional leveraged funding. The other path is the applicant withdraws the project and applies to the Infrastructure Program in 3 years.

Teresa Villegas proposed to fund David M. Gonzales Recreation Center Stormwater Capture and Valley Plaza Park Stormwater Capture Projects and not fund North Hollywood Park Stormwater Capture Projects.

ii) Metro Orange Line a Water Infiltration and Quality Project (LACMTA)

Metro submitted a funding reduction form with significant scope changes. Melissa Faigeles Levitt (LACMTA) responded that their partial funding proposal was to move forward with 4 out of the 7 most cost-effective



properties to reduce capital costs by 28% and limiting O&M funding to \$4.1M. She indicated that the Partial Funding Guidelines were created after they submitted their application and after being agendized to allow opportunity for public comment. Melissa Levitt commented that the reason the County guidelines say that the scope should not be reduced is because it would decrease points but since there are 7 hydrologically distinct properties, the score would not be impacted by a reduction. She mentioned that since the Metro Orange Line Improvement is going out to a design builder early next year, they cannot defer this water infiltration project as they cannot do it as a standalone project.

Max Podemski asked if the WASC could move forward with Metro's change of scope or if it was ineligible because they have changed scope. The District confirmed that the WASC can only move forward with the project as originally proposed.

Teresa Villegas commented on her concerns surrounding the policies for the Partial Funding Guidelines. The District replied that the Partial Funding Guidelines came as a response to allow the WASC more flexibility on funding projects. The project applicant was provided the opportunity to consider less funding if they could leverage funding from other sources.

Teresa Villegas asked Melissa Levitt if the project could be submitted with changes for Round 3. Melissa Levitt responded that it is not feasible for Metro to resubmit for Round 3 because it would be a part of a larger transportation project that will begin design early next year. Melissa Levitt commented that the design would proceed regardless and that Metro does not have the staff to build this as a standalone project.

The committee expressed support to fund the Metro Orange Line a Water Infiltration and Quality Project, but also discussed the large funding request may not allow funding projects with great benefits in future years.

The committee discussed staying under 80% funding allocation but currently there is no recommended allocation percentage. Funding is at the discretion of the WASC.

Paul Alva expressed concern about having enough funding for future years given that TRPs and smaller Cities will come to the WASC for funding.



Cathie Santo Domingo suggested discussing the smaller project before discussing the Metro and LADWP projects. John Huynh commented in support of projects with matching funds to maximize taxpayer benefits.

Teresa Villegas suggested the North Hollywood Park Stormwater Capture Project be postponed to the next cycle of funding. Delon Kwan responded that the project was highly rated, should not be delayed, and although it is a large funding request it has many benefits. Rafael Prieto referenced a larger project issue with Central Santa Monica Bay WASC and that asking the project to delay could be viable.

Ernesto Pantoja commented in favor of fully fund the Metro Orange Line a Water Infiltration and Quality Project with the original scope. Max Podemski agreed. John Luker also commented in favor of the project but expressed that the funding request of \$92M is very large and results in little funding for large or smaller projects in the future.

Patrick DeChellis asked the WASC could hold the funding for the rescoped Metro Orange Line Project and for Metro to resubmit next round with the understanding that the project would get strong consideration. Metro responded that the WASC can make that decision however Metro is moving forward with the larger Orange Line Rapid Transit Improvement project which is going to start design early next year so they would not have a way to build the subject Metro Orange Line Project as a standalone project. Patrick DeChellis asked if an understanding from the WASC that the project would get strong consideration next round is enough for the project to move forward. The District responded that it is acceptable to propose that Metro resubmit their descoped project.

Robert Vega (Sacred Heart Catholic Church, Lincoln Heights) commented in support of the Lincoln Park Project Neighborhood Green Street Network Project.

9. Voting Items

- b) Approve the final Fiscal Year 2021-22 Stormwater Investment Plan funding recommendations for the ULAR Watershed Area and approve submission to the Regional Oversight Committee for review

Ernesto Pantoja motioned to approve the Metro Orange Line a Water Infiltration and Quality Project into the Fiscal Year 2021-22 Stormwater Investment Plan. Max Podemski seconded the motion. The Committee voted to approve the Metro Orange Line a Water Infiltration and Quality Project into the Fiscal Year 2021-22 Stormwater Investment Plan. (Approved, see vote tracking sheet).

Teresa Villegas requested that Victory ES – DROPS funding request be combined into Year 1. The project proponent agreed. Year 1 was changed from \$176,825 to \$178,585 and Years 2 through 5 were changed from \$440 to \$0.

After discussions, Teresa Villegas made a motion to approve the Draft FY21-22 Stormwater Investment Plan including: Infrastructure Program – Victory ES- DROPS, Los Angeles Pierce College Northeast Campus Stormwater Capture & Use and Biofiltration, Metro Orange Line Project a Water Infiltration and Quality Project, Altadena Mariposa Green Street Demonstration Project, David M. Gonzales Recreation Center Stormwater Capture Project, Valley Plaza Park, Broadway-Manchester Multi-Modal Green Streets Project, Altadena – Lake Avenue Green Improvement Project, Lincoln Park Neighborhood Green Street Network, Westmont – Vermont Avenue Green Improvement Project, Arroyo Seco-San Rafael Treatment Wetlands; Metro Orange Line a Water Infiltration and Quality Project; Scientific Studies – Evaluation of Infiltration Testing Methods for Design of Stormwater Drywell Systems, Fire Effects Study in the ULAR Watershed Management Area, LAUSD Living Schoolyards Program Pilot Study; Technical Resources Program – McCambridge Park Stormwater Capture Multi-Benefit and Huntington Drive Regional Green Street. Ernesto Pantoja seconded the motion. The Committee voted to approve the Draft Fiscal Year 2021-22 Stormwater Investment Plan as motioned. (Approved, see vote tracker sheet)
