Quarterly Report 1

March 31, 2021 – June 30, 2021

A. Summary of Activities

Provide a high-level summary of activities completed this quarter and progress made toward completion of the annual scope of work.

Required elements of the Quarterly report to achieve in this summary are:

- Strategies used to integrate priorities for the community, municipalities, the watershed area, and the region
 - o Primary focus: creating, writing and revising the North Santa Monica Bay Watershed Strategic Outreach and Engagement Plan (NSMB SOEP). This took three drafts, many conversations and four months.
 - o Met one on one with NSMB Watershed Area stakeholders, including city staff, water district staff, key agencies such as California Department of State Parks, National Park Service, Santa Monica Mountains Conservancy, National Park Service and local elected officials' staff and community leaders to learn about community priorities. The tone was set with a spectacular first one-on-one meeting with Alex Farassati of City of Calabasas, who provided input for the NSMB SOEP and immediately offered meaningful partnership support, such as offering Founders' Hall in Calabasas for a proposed conference or suggesting we invite highly regarded media team at City of Calabasas to consider filming and editing a film about water quality in the Santa Monica Mountains, while sharing multiple compelling water quality design projects created by City of Calabasas. In addition, a tour of the stunning Las Virgenes-Triunfo Pure Water Project demonstration site lead by Dave Pedersen, General Manager of Las Virgenes Municipal Water District (LVMWD) was inspiring.
 - With Los Angeles County Public Works and key stakeholders, researched how to meet and comply with the Brown Act while functioning as an effective coordinator.
 - Began reaching out to local community leaders like Martin and Sue Schmitt of Topanga, Kian and Joel
 Shulman of Malibu, Don Schmitz of Malibu / Agoura Hills, Joel and Kian Schulman of Malibu and others.
 - Focused on insights from Tevin Schmitt of Wishtoyo about connecting with local First Nations peoples and from Terry Dipple of Las Virgenes Council of Government, who is helping the COG to better assist unhoused community members, to learn how to better serve members of Disadvantaged Communities.
 - on National Park Service (NPS) property, designed and championed by City of Calabasas to address non-point source pollution on city-adjacent NPS properties, including trash, nutrients, bacteria, and copper. Coordinator began to set up a site tour on July 8 to explore project feasibility. Profoundly moved by City of Calabasas' offer to share design, for free, with all local open space agencies, to help improve local water quality; shared this remarkable offer at the North Santa Monica Bay Watershed Area Steering Committee (NSMB WASC) meeting.
 - Connected with green architect Isabelle Duvivier to discuss the feasibility of doing a demonstration project that would use limestone roofing / limestone cisterns to mimic the rainwater capture architecture from Bermuda, which has no natural water sources on the island except rainwater capture.
 - Based on conversation with diverse stakeholders such as Tevin Schmitt of Wishtoyo, Dave Roberts of LVMWD, Dave Rydman of Los Angeles County Waterworks District No. 29, and a look at NSMB WASC Vice Chair Madelyn Glickfeld's magical wildflower meadow front yard, it is evident that Nativescaping, as

a tool for water conservation (and thus increase of access to current water supply), is a top priority in the NSMB Watershed Area.

- Document the extent of partnerships and networks you have engaged
 - Connected with community members in Topanga at Viewridge Estates, during water quality project meeting held by Bruce Hamamoto of Los Angeles County Public Works on Coordinator's first day, March 31, 2021.
 - Reached out to United States Department of Agriculture Natural Resources Conservation Service (USDA-NRCS) to explore potential funding, attended a Funders' Fair event in Sacramento (via Zoom), later sharing California Funding Fairs Handbook and the new California State Library Grant Portal with coordinators and stakeholders, and reached out to One Cause about fundraising.
 - Facilitated community engagement in the Safe, Clean Water Program that focused on writing the draft Strategic Outreach and Engagement Plan, which has been co-created with input from members of the NSMB WASC that the Coordinator has connected to as individuals and with input from concerned community members, including but not limited to Chad Christensen, Tevin Schmitt, Roxanne Hughes, Katie Yaroslavsky, Sophie Freeman, Joe Bellomo, Kelsey Reed, Dave Roberts and Madelyn Glickfeld. Coordinator plans to meet with Francine Diamond, Dr. Richard Ambrose, Jerry West and David Szymanski.
 - Connected via telephone with Janet Turner from Office of Congressman Lieu, to explore using federal funding via The Great American Outdoors Act to support proposed Morrison Ranch Parking project.
 - At the suggestion of NSMB WASC Vice Chair Madelyn Glickfeld, Coordinator has invited the Los Angeles Regional Water Quality Control Board staff to come present to the NSMB WASC about the trash conditional permit and connected with both staff and leaders at State Parks, National Park Service and Mountains Recreation Authority to invite them to come hear this presentation and to connect with project ideas that could be funded by Safe, Clean Water Program to better serve the entire Watershed Area.
 - Began to connect City of Malibu staff and Water District 29 to LVMWWD, TreePeople and TreeTrust to collaborate on their Native Plants initiative that could become watershed-wide.
- Document your effort to engage a broad set of conventional and unconventional stakeholders
 - O While staying in touch with community members at Viewridge Estates, Coordinator became aware of local angst about perceived maintenance gaps for newly planted trees on Viewridge. Coordinator connected with Art Murphy, District Tree Superintendent at County of Los Angeles Public Works, to allow community members to feel heard. Kudos to Alberto Grajeda, Los Angeles County Public Works for grace in working to resolve dilemmas.
 - Attended a class on growing native plants lead by Antonio Sanchez, Santa Monica Mountains Fund, became aware of his deep concern for the under-funded low-income BIPOC interns (\$20 per day) he has on staff who are in need of a living wage to sustain their work on Woolsey Fire restoration.
 - Committed to reaching out to fellow Watershed Coordinators Carlos Moran and Rich Watson, to learn more about workforce development opportunities.
 - Community members who engaged in NSMB SOEP development and/or watershed insights include:
 Nathan Hamburger of City of Agoura Hills, Kirsten James of community member / water quality expert and Dr. David White from Once Upon a Watershed in Ojai working in Ventura County.
 - Joined the Board of Directors of the California Watershed Network; shared their assessments of upcoming watershed-related legislation both within the NSMB WASC and with the Regional Watershed Coordinators group.

- Additional time with valuable connections includes lunch with former watershed coordinator Blake
 Whittington, phone calls with Debra Sharpton, focusing on a potential project at Seminole Springs, a
 meeting with Tom Hicks, a water rights lawyer, to learn about his current work in sustaining streamflow
 in Ventura and elsewhere and a phone call with community member Michael Almory focusing on his
 projects to improve water quality.
- Invited Erik Ringelberg of California Director of Freshwater Trust to become potential board member for California Watershed Network. Strongly support CA Watershed Network aspirations to include more BIPOC on Board of Directors.
- o Established a good rapport with Heather McIntire, a grant administrator at the California Wildlife Board.
- Reconnected with former State Senator Fran Pavley.
- Connected green architect/sustainability star Isabelle Duvivier to Katy Yaroslavsky of Office of Supervisor Kuehl, because of their shared perspective on the value of trees in Nature Based Solutions.
- Jeremy Wolf, Chief of Staff for Senator Henry Stern and Coordinator met Jerry West, Interim Director of California Department of State Parks (Malibu) and staffer Danielle LeFer to invite them to participate in the Safe, Clean Water Program funding opportunities.

 - Connected with Dawn Afman of USDA-NRCS to explore funding and saddened to learn that funds are only allocated for agricultural sites now

Summary of leverage funding pursuits

Leveraging funding is vital to future project implementation. Numerous local NSMB projects could become Wildlife Conservation Board funding recipients. Key information about the relevant funding opportunities was shared both with NSMB stakeholders and Regional Watershed Coordinator group, focusing on the Habitat Enhancement and Restoration program, the California Riparian Habitat Conservation program and the Public Access program. Prior to submitting a potential project concept proposal for planning for the Wildlife Conservation Board for Public Access, the NSMB Watershed Coordinator asked the other coordinators if any of them were thinking of applying, clearing the way for a potential ask by the NSMB via City of Calabasas / NPS, should NPS decide to consider some version of the Morrison Ranch project proposal idea.

F. Engagement efforts benefitting Disadvantaged Communities

Summarize activities undertaken which have benefitted members of disadvantaged communities. Distinguish between targeted efforts and ones that could benefit all communities.

Spoke with Tevin Schmitt, Wishtoyo about opportunities to collaborate with Chumash community members.

Met Antonio Sanchez, Nursery Manager of Santa Monica Mountains Fund, on June 23 and was inspired by his program to teach BIPOC low-income students and young adults horticulture, focusing on locally sourced native plant on NPS properties. His interns are grossly underfunded, earning \$20 a day for a five-day week, and frequently have to abandon the program to support themselves and their families. The NSMB WASC needs to consider workforce funding opportunities for this brilliant program.

At the first Regional Watershed Coordinators coordination event on June 21 from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Mike Antos emphasized that each of us need to become "experts in Measure W" which everyone took to heart. The comments of

Carlos Moran, Richard Watson and a number of other coordinators on how they aim to use Watershed Coordinator work to foment local job opportunities was particularly inspiring.

G. Scheduling concerns or issues

Discuss any scheduling concerns and issues encountered that may delay completion of the program or project. Describe any anticipated schedule or budget modifications.

Initially, Los Angeles County Counsel expressed concern over Watershed Coordinator's outreach to stakeholders inadvertently triggering the Brown Act. This severely limited outreach in the early stages. With thoughtful leadership from Mr. Dave Pedersen, General Manager at LVMWD, and carefully crafted language processed by Los Angeles County Counsel, the NSMB WASC has been able to begin to allow the Watershed Coordinator to reach out to individual stakeholders one on one. This was vital because creating a meaningful NSMB SOEP was predicated upon deep conversations with stakeholders and community leaders.

Writing and rewriting the NSMB SOEP took multiple drafts. Though multiple drafts were available to stakeholders prior to the end of the first quarter, the vote for the current draft will happen on August 12, 2021. Coordinator would like to point out that Mike Antos' insight that projects and programs created and/or funded by the coordinator's efforts will need to be implemented by other entities was the deciding point that will (as per the next quarterly report) allow the NSMB WASC to pass the plan.

H. Expected activities next quarter

Invited to attend Las Virgenes-Malibu Council of Governments on July 20 and introduced leadership and attendees to the potential for the coordinator to assist in the community's work to meet Measure W related goals and opportunities.

Facilitating community engagement meeting in support of Los Angeles County Department of Public Works' Liberty Canyon Green Street project for an application due on July 30 with the goal of eliciting community support letters; event to be set for July 15.

First public NSMB Watershed Area Community meeting will be set for Thursday, September 23, 2021 in the evening. Coordinator plans to invite guest speakers, Bermuda architect / artist John Gardner and fog catcher creator Abel Cruz Gutierrez from Peruanas Sin Agua. In order to increase community participation, Coordinator will ask community leaders to function as co-hosts.

Invited to attend weekly native plants outreach planning group run by Dave Roberts of LVMWD along with a team from TreePeople / TreeTrust.

Looking forward both to being a part of the Calabasas Pumpkin Festival and speaking at the Calabasas Environmental Committee meeting in November.

Task 1: Facilitate Community Engagement in Safe, Clean Water Act Program

Strategic Outreach and Engagement Plan

The Strategic Outreach and Engagement Plan will drive my work; I have 12 (10 now?) weeks to co-create this. The Strategic Outreach and Engagement Plan will be a living document.

Tasks include:

- Engage watershed community members

Hello Jerry,

First things first, I'd love to meet -- in person or in zoom or via phone -- in the next week or so to chat about State Parks current work and potential funding needs, and then to talk about how Measure W could become a tool to help you help our open space. In the past "Nature Based Solutions" which solve water quality programs had a limited definition, but there is big (big) pressure to make this support creek restoration / riparian habitat, which could serve State Parks' goals while addressing water quality goals. It would be helpful if you or your staff could provide insights about how creek restoration / riparian habitat improves water quality in stream (i.e. reduces nutrients / bacteria via natural processes.)

Next, there's a charismatic potential project at Morrison Ranch at the mouth of Las Virgenes Canyon in which City of Calabasas has donated (!) staff time to provide NPS with a free concept / engineering drawings for a trailhead with signage, ADA, permeable paving, trash pick up, bathrooms, biofiltration, in order to address water quality coming out of the park...which of course is incoming into Calabasas and thus becomes Calabasas' problem downstream.

This is a pretty innovative approach and might become a template for work in other open spaces areas. I'd like to invite you and your staff to join us for a tour on foot in July to consider how this could work at that site. Currently I'm doing a WCB concept proposal to try to get planning money for the project and Alex Farassati (city staff) and I will work on funding implementation for the whole thing if all goes well. City staff will manage implementation if the grants are funded, with NPS (probably) as project lead.

Next, we're getting regional board to come to the next North Santa Monica Bay Watershed steering committee to talk trash -- which I know is probably your least favorite subject running the State Parks in the Santa Monica Mountains -- but between proposed trash reduction legislation from Senator Sterns's office and the idea of the watershed potentially working collaboratively on trailheads to reduce trash. /human waste concerns, maybe we can all collectively make some forward progress.

As a lifelong hiker in the Santa Monica Mountains, I just want you to know how much I appreciate the work that you and your staff do every day. Melina

Good afternoon Mr. Szymanski and Ms. Beck,

I want to introduce you to an intriguing project that would support long-term NPS goals for the Upper Las Virgenes Canyon Open Space Preserve, located at the Morrison Ranch trailhead.

As the city downstream of the Upper Las Virgenes Canyon Open Space Preserve, Calabasas shares the same pressure to address water quality concerns that are defined by the Regional Water Quality Control Board via total maximum daily loads, including trash, metals and oil coming off of parked cars, nutrients and bacteria.

Thinking holistically, Alex Farassati, Environmental Services Manager at Calabasas, convinced the city that creating a project concept with design to include parking with permeable paving for cars, RVS and horse trailers, trash containers, a bathroom, biofiltration strips using native plants, a trailhead kiosk with map and signage in English and Spanish and creating a turnaround point in the street to access these facilities, would help NPS -- and downstream neighbor Calabasas -- address many elements of water quality concerns, while creating a charismatic entry point into the mountains.

The design is a conceptual plan and is 80% ready, but the construction plans need to be developed from scratch. The City of Calabasas is offering to donate this design, help seek funding with the support of the new watershed coordinator, Melina Watts (me) and manage project implementation on behalf of NPS.

This morning, Alex and I met with Heather McInstire at the Wildlife Conservation Board via Zoom this morning. Alex and I think our community has a good shot at getting \$250K for planning funds from the WCB. If successful, the next step would be to seek funding for project implementation, at an estimated cost of \$700K. The City of Calabasas is willing to seek both rounds of funding and to provide staff to manage construction. To move forward, NPS would need to sign off on grant applications and we would need a letter of commitment from NPS to manage operations and management for 25 years to submit to funders.

Alex and I would like to set up a tour of the proposed Morrison Ranch project opportunity, potentially on either June 22 or June 23 at 9:00 a.m.

We can change the date if these options are not a good fit for NPS.

So when I was on the Regional Board we encouraged cities to consider permeable paving and stormwater infiltration where it worked as a part of a repaving project.
