A. Summary of Activities

During this quarter (June 1, 2021-August 31, 2021), the Watershed Coordinator (WC) made progress toward all 9 task activities. On June 3, 2021 the contract was executed with Council for Watershed Health for Carlos Moran to serve as one of the three Watershed Coordinators for the Upper Los Angeles River Watershed Area. Effort was focused on the on-boarding process and on developing and finalizing the Strategic Outreach and Engagement Plan (SOEP) (Attachment A-1). A survey was developed and administered to WASC members and key stakeholders to inform the development of the SOEP. This SOEP was developed collaboratively with the two other Watershed Coordinators, Clarasophia Gust and Adi Liberman, and approved by the ULAR WASC. During this quarter, the Watershed Coordinator identified and engaged target audiences across stakeholders groups such as the North Hills Neighborhood Council, the Neighborhood Sustainability Council, LA River Urban Federal Waters Program, US Forest Service, US EPA, Tataviam Land Conservancy and Fernandeño Tataviam Band of Mission Indians, and Water Education for elected Latino Leaders. The watershed coordinator identified community priorities through meetings with these agencies and community based organizations. A total of 54 meetings were held or attended in this first quarter. During this quarter, Watershed Coordinator worked on creating systems to track and develop project concepts including project planning discussions with Community Based Organizations (CBOs) to identify their climate and water resiliency needs.

The Watershed Coordinator conducted outreach at the Elmer Avenue and Elmer Paseo project sites. The Watershed Coordinator continued to meet with interested parties to build awareness of the SCWP and this role, and solicit local priorities. Additionally, the Watershed Coordinator also worked on integrating SCWP priorities by coordinating, attending, and following up on meetings with the Resources Legacy Fund, Pacific institute, Water Education for Latino Leaders (WELL), CA Ocean Protection Council's Equity Advisory Council, IRWM ULAR and LSGLAR Subregion Committees, OurWaterLA, GreenLA, and Friends of the LA River amongst others. In each of these meetings an overview of the SCWP and the role of Watershed Coordinators was provided. Additionally, the Watershed Coordinator maintained active involvement with other regional Watershed Coordinators participating in monthly meetings, coordinated meetings between CBOs and the ULAR watershed coordinator, met with a subcommittee of coordinators to create a collective strategy for integrating school greening projects into the SCWP, developed a funding working group and met with coordinators with shared borders to discuss shared outreach, education and project development strategies.

On behalf of the Council for Watershed Health (CWH), it is my pleasure to offer our full support for Special Service for Groups' Asian Pacific Islander Forward Movement's (SSG/APIFM) proposal to the Environmental Justice Small Grants Program for its "Water Is Life", a culturally and linguistically tailored water education program.

For over 20 years, CWH has advanced the understanding of storm water as an asset and contributed its expertise to the design and implementation of nature-based, multi-benefit storm water projects throughout the Los Angeles region. SSG/APIFM's project aligns with CWH's mission to advance the health and sustainability of our region's watersheds, rivers, streams and habitat - both in natural areas and urban neighborhoods. CWH sees this proposed project as an opportunity to advance watershed health for the region and strongly supports this project.

CWH is presently collaborating with SSG/APIFM to develop its long-term capacity to support the development of local water supply and storm water management while achieving multibenefits, such as public health, greening, and safety for the Asian American, Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander (AANHPI) community in the San Gabriel Valley (SGV). The collaboration was informed by our Community Dialogues on Green Infrastructure and Social Impact study where we hosted local dialogues to understand water issues facing their community and identify opportunities for water capture, active transportation, and public safety projects in Los Angeles County.

SSG/APIFM will engage AANHPI communities in the SGV, especially Alhambra and Monterey Park where data shows that both cities rank highest within the region as it pertains to levels of



pollution and opportunities for infiltration and water quality improvements. SSG/APIFM has a long history of culturally and linguistically appropriate community engagement, education and mobilization to reach the diverse AANHPI communities around environmental justice issues such as air quality. Through its Water Is Life project, SSG/APIFM will increase awareness of water quality, water conservation, and water capture issues among residents of the SGV through in language workshops, videos, flyers, and social media outreach.

CWH will continue its collaboration with SSG/APIFM through our Redesign LA cohort-based learning community to help increase the capacity of SSG/APIFM with knowledge and technical support to leverage resources and achieve multiple social impacts in health, safety, and a more equitable distribution of local resources. We encourage California Environmental Protection Agency to support the efforts of SSG/APIFM to develop and implement its Water Is Life project, bringing much needed education and action to the AANHPI community, which has been severely under-reached around water issues.

Quarterly Report: Q2 February 18, 2022

A. Summary of Activities

Provide a high-level summary of activities completed this quarter and progress made toward completion of the annual scope of work.

During this quarter (October 1, 2021-December 31, 2021), the Watershed Coordinator (WC) made progress toward all 9 task activities. Discussions were held with community based organizations, non-profits organizations, agencies, and private philanthropy entities to identify their climate and water resiliency needs/interest and potential intersections with SCWP. For example, WC met with IRWM DACIP project team (TreePeople lead), Heal the Bay, City of Glendale, City of San Fernando, The Fernandeno Tataviam Band of Mission Indians, SCW County Unincorporated Area Planning team, City of LA SCW working group (LA Sanitation lead), City Plants various Community Based Organizations (CBOs) and LA neighborhood councils. The Watershed Coordinator raised awareness about the SCWP, discussed the WC role, partnerships, cost-share partners and community needs. Additionally, these meetings resulted in identification of community priorities, parallel efforts, future engagement opportunities and cost-share partnerships. A total of 103 coordinating meetings/events were held or attended in this first quarter.

In person, WC attended outreach and education events in the Upper LA River Watershed. Examples of the events include the Hispanic Heritage Month Tree Planting & Tree Adoption in Sun Valley and such as Coastal CleanUp Day on the LA River. WC conducted neighborhood outreach and community surveys at Elmer Avenue and Elmer Paseo project sites (Attachment B-8). Outreach and education efforts included developing educational materials and signage. The WC developed social media strategy and content to expand bilingual (English and Spanish) social media presence and outreach efforts by creating a CWH ULAR WC website, Facebook group, newsletter and Twitter. The Watershed Coordinator also worked on developing a geographic point of contact map for the ULAR Watershed Coordinators (Attachment A-1)

The WC tracked and was involved in coordinating parallel regional efforts including meetings with the City of LA SCW Working Group, the City of LA Measure W Administrative Oversight Committee, ARLA, IRWM DACIP (WaterTalks), LLAR and USGR WASC, LARC meetings, and LA Urban Waters Federal Partnerships. WC worked collaboratively with other ULAR Watershed Coordinators including outreach, education and social media strategy. WC also kept regular communication and coordination with SCWP regional Watershed Coordinators through monthly meetings and ad-hoc meetings. Regional coordination resulted in the Watershed Coordinators Funding Working Group and Watershed Coordinator Schools and Stormwater Working Group. Additionally, WC participated in coordinating, developing and hosting the two part 2021 Water Equity and Anti-racism Trainings for the LA Urban Waters Federal Partnership and regional WCs, support staff, and County representatives. Attended a series of webinars to help identify community priorities, cost-share partners and leveraging funding opportunities. All of these efforts fostered a collaborative environment and created stronger/effective strategies for engaging with communities and partners. Additionally, effort was placed on developing a social media presence, tracking of interested parties, incoming grants, and events was consistently monitored.



Elmer Avenue Green Street: Reset Refresh Community Survey

Due to its proneness to flooding and its unique location in the watershed, the Elmer Avenue Green Street, which includes Elmer Avenue and the walkway south of Elmer known as Elmer Paseo, was selected as a stormwater management demonstration project. The demonstration project included the installation and construction of various features that would improve water quality, reduce flooding, reduce water use, increase watershed awareness, enhance neighborhood aesthetics, and increase wildlife habitats. Features included two catch basins, three infiltration galleries, bioswales, permeable surfaces, rain barrels, drip irrigation, and native and drought tolerant landscapes.

It's been 10 years since Elmer Avenue and eight years since Elmer Paseo were completed. These projects have aged and are in need of maintenance (including replanting and sediment removal). The Council for Watershed Health has secured funding for planned improvements on Elmer Paseo and we are working to secure funding for Elmer Avenue.
