A. Summary of Activities

Following is a summary of activities completed during the first quarter of Year 2, and progress made toward completion of the annual scope of work. TreePeople is honored and grateful to serve as Coordinator for the Santa Clara River Watershed Area.

1. <u>Strategies used to integrate priorities for the community, municipalities, the watershed area, and the region</u>

TreePeople moved further on project development for unincorporated areas in the watershed, drawing on resources provided by the WaterTalks Program (IRWM Disadvantaged Community Involvement Program). This is a continuation of a key strategy used throughout Year One. These projects include:

- 1) Rural Water Supply Reliability,
- 2) Arundo Removal and Management in the Santa Clara River ecosystem,
- 3) Acton Flooding Multi-benefit Solution
- 4) Native American Land Restoration with the Tataviam Land Conservancy.

Funding has been awarded for the first project, and a workplan will be developed for it's delivery. The remaining projects are under development which is expected to carry into 2023. Additional projects that may be developed as resources allow include Tap Water Quality Testing Program, Septic Evaluation and Repair Support, and facilitation Small Water System Partnerships.

Of special strategic note is the Arundo removal project; a pre-proposal was submitted to the Strategic Growth Council to build capacity and community engagement for the program.

Should this effort be successful, it would provide the Watershed Wide Arundo Management group with multi-year coordination to help define a Watershed-wide management structure and launch campaigns to secure major funding for implementation.

2. Partnerships and networks engaged

Much of our focus continued to be on meetings related to project development, including the Acton and Agua Dulce Town Councils and the Watershed-Wide Arundo Management Group (WWAM). We continued to build relationships with what we consider to be a core group of environmental advocacy and education interests in the area including Sierra Club, Santa Clarita Hiking Club, Santa Clarita Organization for Planning and the Environment and the Climate Change League, among others.

Another major network continues to be the collective of Watershed Coordinators across the SCWP. We attended monthly Coordinator meetings throughout the quarter and supported other Coordinator's efforts. Of special note was our participation as a co-host in the Stormwater and Schools Symposium (education event) in May and hosting a tour of TreePeople Center's stormwater BMPs in July for SSMB Watershed Coordinators.

3. Engagement of conventional and unconventional stakeholders

Two surveys were created and distributed across the region to 1) determine topics of interest from which we can shape education events and 2) shape a possible project to assess septic systems.

TreePeople's engagement also included a presence at the 2-day Home and Garden Show, with an estimated audience of 10,000 people.

TreePeople continued to serve on the SCWP Metrics and Monitoring Stakeholder Advisory Committee and participated in the July workshop. The process will continue over several months. We are only one of two Watershed Coordinators asked to participate.

Finally, updates on our activities were provided to the WASC as well as Town Council leaders throughout the period.

F. Engagement efforts benefitting Disadvantaged Communities

TreePeople continued to prioritize outreach efforts during the period on unincorporated communities in the Watershed Area. These areas are considered "underrepresented" by the WaterTalks program. TreePeople engaged a dedicated Community Organizer for the watershed area in May, who canvassed state-defined Disadvantaged Communities in general outreach and surveying – including Bouquet Canyon, Canyon Country and Newall.

There were no scheduling concerns during this period.

H. Expected activities next quarter

- Develop and/or support 2-4 education events.
- Define remaining projects to be developed through the WaterTalks program, and potential funding sources to support them.

- Support development of a funding application for the Regional Climate Collaborate (due Oct 7).
