A. Summary of Activities

Overview:

The third quarter includes the months of December 2021, January 2022, and February 2022.

Mr. Liberman and the EOS team prepared updates for and attended WASC meetings in December, January, and February.

Progress reports were prepared and submitted for each month of the quarter, as well as the second quarterly report prepared and submitted in January.

The Team also began preparations for a large update presentation to the WASC on the progress of outreach and engagement over the past year:

- Mr. Liberman continued to progress Community Driven Projects and attend Community Outreach Events.
- The EOS Team developed the ULAR WC Newsletter and continued to develop the ULAR social media presence.
- The team attended three monthly Watershed Coordinator Zoom meetings to collaborate with all the other Watershed Coordinators.
- Mr. Liberman prepared for and hosted the February Watershed Coordinator meeting, focusing on project development.

Community Driven Projects

<u>December</u> - Mr. Liberman, along with CWH, met with LA Sanitation to discuss the roles and responsibilities of the watershed coordinators, review the City of Los Angeles projects for regional Round 3 consideration, discuss other project applications in the City of LA (not LASAN led), and to review ongoing efforts including community events attended by the watershed coordinators, the City of LA's SOEP and City of LA SCWP Project Sign Design Guidelines. A regular meeting was established between the ULAR Watershed Coordinators and the City of LA. The ULAR Watershed Coordinators met with the County Unincorporated Areas on December 14 to review projects in development and discuss how the watershed coordinators can be of support. Mr. Liberman continued to meet with representatives of City of LA City Council #3, City of LA Recreation and Parks, City of LA Department of Water and Power, and City of LA Department of Sanitation to discuss a potential project at Reseda Park along the banks of the Los Angeles River. Mr. Liberman attended a meeting of the Safe, Clean Water Program - City of Los Angeles Working Group on December 2.

<u>January</u> - A. Liberman, along with CWH, met with LA Sanitation on January 10 to review the City of Los Angeles projects for regional Round 3 consideration, discuss other project applications in the City of LA (not LASAN led), and to review ongoing efforts including community events attended by the watershed coordinators, the City of LA's SOEP and City of LA SCWP Project Sign Design Guidelines. A. Liberman held

multiple meetings with J. Luker and W. Gladstone of Save Chatsworth regarding a potential project, the Chatsworth Nature Preserve. The ULAR Watershed Coordinators held their monthly meeting with County UA on January 26 and to review action items for the December 2021 meeting, saw a presentation by the County on Magic Johnson Park and Roosevelt Park, received project updates from the County, discussed February 17 Park Tour logistics, and reviewed the TRP process. On January 11, A. Liberman met with representatives of City of LA City Council #3, City of LA Recreation and Parks, City of LA Department of Water and Power, and City of LA Department of Sanitation to discuss a potential project at Reseda Park Triangle along the banks of the Los Angeles River. On January 18, A. Liberman and J. Amarant met with A. Farassati of the City of Calabasas to prepare for a February 1 presentation to the Calabasas Environmental Commission. A. Liberman and J. Amarant worked together to prepare a PowerPoint presentation on the Safe, Clean, Water Program for the Calabasas meeting.

<u>February</u> - A. Liberman presented on the Safe, Clean Water Program to the Calabasas Environmental Commission on February 1. A. Liberman met John Luker, Wendi Gladstone, DWP, the RCD and other stakeholders to further develop the Chatsworth Nature Preserve project on February 2 and February 24. A. Liberman joined M. Watts, Watershed Coordinator for the North Santa Monica Bay, for a tour of Calabasas High School on February 8 regarding a potential stormwater management project on campus. On February 9, A. Liberman met with representatives of City of LA City Council #3, City of LA Recreation and Parks, City of LA Department of Water and Power, and City of LA Department of Sanitation for their monthly meeting to discuss a potential project at Reseda Park Triangle. A. Liberman researched feasibility studies that would serve as a good example and shared it with the Reseda Park Triangle team. A. Liberman, along with CWH, met with LASAN for their regularly monthly meeting on February 14. On February 17, A. Liberman joined CWH and County UA for the County's tour of Magic Johnson Park and Roosevelt Park.

Community Outreach Events

A. Liberman worked with M. Watts on preparations to share a booth at the April 2022 Earth Day Celebration/Green Expo in Calabasas since the two watersheds overlap in Calabasas.

In February, A. Liberman attended a webinar on the Roll Out of Federal and State Water Funding on January 26. On January 27, A. Liberman met with C. Mossavi, A. Castro, and J. Chang of the LA Department of Water and Power regarding LADWP funding partnerships.

Social Media and eNewsletter Development

Amarant shared images and videos from her visit to a "What is a Watershed" exhibit at a museum in Redding, CA with the other Watershed Coordinators for inspiration. A. - 3. Assist the Montecito Heights with their hillside restoration efforts. Determine whether Measure W funds could be used for site acquisition (Answer is yes).
- 4. Work with City of LA neighborhood councils to determine how to extend the current walkway on Tujunga Wash into the Valley Village neighborhood.
- 5. Continue to work with the MRCA on identifying potential projects and partnerships in the ULAR region.
- 6. Attend community events to facilitate outreach and engagement with residents and others.
- 7. Organize a tour of City of LA projects in the ULAR Watershed.
- 8. Develop a proposal to engage the business community on Measure W and the Safe, Clean Water Program issues through a public forum proposed to take place in June 2022.
- 9. Provide outreach and engagement support to the McCambridge Park Stormwater Capture Project in Burbank, California.

Quarterly Report 3
December 2021 - February 2022

A. Summary of Activities

Provide a high-level summary of activities completed this quarter and progress made toward completion of the annual scope of work.

During Quarter 3 (December 1, 2021 - February 28, 2022), the Watershed Coordinator Clarasophia Gust made progress toward Task 1-9. In this quarter, a focus for the Watershed Coordinator was continuing to identify and engage target audiences across interested party groups and identifying community priorities of said groups. A total of 96 meetings and events were held or attended in this third quarter. The Watershed Coordinator had discussions with City of LA and County Unincorporated Area SCWP project teams, City of La Canada Flintridge, La Canada Flintridge Country Club, Local Government Commission, LA ROSAH Collaborative, LA Commons, Mountains Recreation & Conservation Authority, LA Metro, Tataviam Land Conservancy, WHAM Taskforce, US Army Corp of Engineers, Arroyo Seco Foundation, API Forward Movement, The Nature Conservancy, ARLA, Promesa Boyle Heights, LA County Bike Coalition, and the IRWM DACIP project team, among many others. These discussions resulted in identification of priorities, parallel efforts, community engagement opportunities, and project opportunities. The Watershed Coordinator focused on supporting current TRP projects for the City of South Pasadena and City of Alhambra, providing comments on designs to the design team and connecting the projects to interested community parties and facilitating dialogue. The Watershed Coordinator also hosted an educational water tour of Magic Johnson Park and Roosevelt Park in collaboration with LA County Public Works and the other ULAR Watershed Coordinators, which brought together the LA County Public Works water quality team with local community-based organizations to learn from each other. Several collateral materials were generated from the event including social media posts and videos. The Watershed Coordinator also supported ULAR Watershed Coordinator Carlos Moran, Heal the Bay, and Council District 9 on an outreach event titled Innell Woods Park: Creating More Sustainable Communities. Both events generated awareness of the SCWP, solicited local priorities, and helped identify potential project concepts. In January, the Watershed Coordinator gave a presentation to the ULAR WASC about the SWDP's required disadvantaged community benefit programming as a resource to inform their decision making process.

During this quarter the Watershed Coordinator placed effort in adding to an interested parties database, event tracking, and grant tracking. The Watershed Coordinator also participated in the Schools and Stormwater Working Group to create a collective strategy for tracking school greening efforts and involving schools in regional stormwater projects. An educational event targeting schools is being planned for May 19, 2022. Effort was also placed on attending, preparing, and following up on coordination meetings with the other CWH Watershed Coordinator, Carlos Moran, and the rest of the CWH team to continue to outreach to CBOs to identify their sphere of outreach influence, maintain social media and online platforms, event tracking, grant tracking, and adding to an interested parties database.

As mentioned, the Watershed Coordinator worked in close collaboration with the other CWH Watershed Coordinator, Carlos Moran, as part of the CWH Watershed Coordination Team, and coordinated efforts with the third ULAR Watershed Coordinator with Environmental Outreach Strategies, Adi Liberman. Likewise, the Watershed Coordinator also tracked and participated in parallel regional efforts including key committee meetings such as the City of LA Measure W Working Group, the LACPW Unincorporated Area projects team, and GreenLA Water Committee. In this period the Watershed Coordinator continued to attend regional WC meetings and the ULAR WASC meetings and provided a presentation about DAC benefits programming. Effort was also placed on coordination meetings with the ULAR watershed coordination team, including Environmental Outreach Strategies, and collaborating with the team on communications materials such as a newsletter and maintaining social media and online platforms including the ULAR Facebook Group and Twitter page.

Outreach and education activities are targeted toward environmentally and economically stressed communities. Examples of the events include the Inell Woods Park project outreach event; and the Water Projects Tour of Magic Johnson Park and Roosevelt Park. All outreach events and project sites are located in severely stressed communities. Meetings were held with community based organizations that represent these communities in an effort to identify how Watershed Coordination can support their work and expertise. The Watershed Coordinator has also been coordinating with the ongoing Greater LA County IRWM Disadvantaged Community Involvement Program which conducted a water needs assessment across the County which will provide valuable knowledge and opportunity to integrate community-identified priorities into regional programs such as the Safe, Clean Water Program.



Relevant information in the Project Module Consideration for "Direct Benefit" Determination Long Term Vision for Disadvantaged Community Benefits Experience to-date in the Regional Program reveals that aspects of Safe, Clean Water Program (SCWP) related to providing Disadvantaged Community Benefits require further guidance to better support achieving the outcomes sought. The SCWP emphasizes investments that produce benefits in or directly to disadvantaged communities. Complying with the Disadvantaged Community Benefit policy in the Program is complex, and asserting what benefits accrue to which communities is not easily quantified As of May 2021, the District Program is developing a study which, among many things, will review how other funding programs that direct investment in disadvantaged communities have worked to overcome the many challenges that remain when seeking to implement the SCWP policy. That study will inform future guidance, currently expected in the Spring of 2022, in support of Stormwater Investment Plan (SIP) development in the Regional Program for Year 4 (2022-23).

Program Definitions

"'Disadvantaged community' means a census block group that has an annual median household income of less than eighty percent (80%) of the Statewide annual median household income (as defined in Water Code section 79505.5)." (Section 16.03(H))

"'Disadvantaged Community (DAC) Benefit' means a Water Quality Benefit, Water Supply Benefit, and/or Community Investment Benefit located in a DAC or providing benefits directly to a DAC population." (Section 16.03(I))

"Water Quality Benefit" means a reduction in Stormwater or Urban Runoff pollution, such as improvements in the chemical, physical, and biological characteristics of Stormwater or Urban Runoff in the District. Activities resulting in this benefit include but are not limited to: infiltration or treatment of Stormwater or Urban Runoff, non-point source pollution control, and diversion of Stormwater or Urban Runoff to a sanitary sewer system. (Section 16.03(NN))

"Water Supply Benefit" means an increase in the amount of locally available water supply, provided there is a nexus to Stormwater or Urban Runoff capture. Activities resulting in this benefit include, but are not limited to, the following: reuse and conservation practices, diversion of Stormwater or Urban Runoff to a sanitary sewer system for direct or indirect water recycling, increased groundwater replenishment or available yield, or offset of potable water use. (Section 16.03(OO))


"Community Investment Benefit" means a benefit created in conjunction with a Project or Program, such as, but not limited to: improved flood management, flood conveyance, or flood risk mitigation; creation, enhancement or restoration of parks, habitat or wetlands; improved public access to waterways; enhanced or new recreational opportunities: and greening of schools. A Community Investment Benefit also includes a benefit to the community derived from a Project or Program that improves public health by reducing heat island effect and increasing shade or planting of trees or other vegetation that increase carbon reduction/sequestration and improve air quality. (Section 16.03(F))

December 2021 - February 2022

A. Summary of Activities

Provide a high-level summary of activities completed this quarter and progress made toward completion of the annual scope of work.

During Quarter 3 (December 1, 2021 - February 28, 2022), the Watershed Coordinator Carlos Moran made progress toward Task 1-9. In this quarter, the watershed coordinator placed emphasis on continuing to identify and engage target audiences across interested party groups and identifying community priorities of said groups. A total of 100 meetings and events were held or attended in this third quarter. The Watershed Coordinator had discussions with City of LA SCWP project team, LA County Public Works Unincorporated Area SCWP project teams, Southeast Neighborhood Council, City of San Fernando, City of Glendale, CA Ocean Protection Council EJ advisory committee, Green LA Coalition, Clean Water Action, Tataviam Land Conservancy, CA Coastal Water Keeper, LA METRO, and the IRWM DACIP project team among others (see Section B). These discussions resulted in identification of priorities, parallel efforts, community engagement opportunities and project opportunities. Additionally, progress was made toward developing the following projects in ULAR: Rudy Ortega Park (San Fernando & Tataviam Tribe), Pacoima Wash Bike Path (San Fernando), Bill Greene Memorial Park (LA City), Slauson and Wall Park Project (LA City), and Mobile Hygiene Stations (regional).

On Feb 17th the Watershed Coordinator attended the SMMC Upper Los Angeles River and Tributaries Working Group meeting to introduce SCWP, watershed coordination and express support for the Pacoima Wash Loop Activation Projects led by KDI and Pacoima Beautiful and the Pacoima Wash Greenway Augmentation Project led by the City of San Fernando. The coordinated effort resulted in a recommendation of funding by the SMMC ULART Working Group for two projects that meet the goals of the SCWP. The Watershed Coordinator also organized and led an educational water tour of Magic Johnson park and Roosevelt Park and generated collateral material from the event. This tour fostered conversation and partnership between LA County Public Works staff and participating community-based organizations. The Watershed Coordinator also led planning with support from ULAR Watershed Coordinator Clarasophia Gust, Heal the Bay, and Council District 9 on an outreach event titled Innell Woods Park: Creating More Sustainable Communities. Both events generated awareness of the SCWP, solicited local priorities, and helped identify potential project concepts.

During the third quarter the Watershed Coordinator also continued to emphasize adding to an interested parties database, event tracking, and grant tracking. The Watershed Coordinator participated in the Schools and Stormwater Working Group to create a collective strategy for tracking school greening efforts and involving schools in regional stormwater projects. An educational event targeting schools is being planned for May 2022. Effort was also placed on coordinating and hosting 2021 Water Equity and Anti-Racism Trainings for the SCWP Watershed Coordinators; attending, preparing and following up on coordination meetings with the ULAR watershed coordination team, SCWP Schools Working Group, and regional WC team. The Watershed Coordinator supported the other CWH Watershed Coordinator, Clarasophia Gust, in giving a presentation to the ULAR WASC about the SWDP's required disadvantaged community benefit programming as a resource to inform their decision making process.

Throughout this quarter the Watershed Coordinator worked in close collaboration with the other CWH Watershed Coordinator, Clarasophia Gust, as part of the CWH Watershed Coordination Team, and coordinated efforts with the third ULAR Watershed Coordinator with Environmental Outreach Strategies, Adi Liberman. Likewise, the Watershed Coordinator also tracked and participated in parallel regional efforts including key committee meetings such as IRWM DACIP/Water Talks.

Outreach and education activities were targeted toward environmentally and economically stressed communities. The Watershed Coordinator has also been coordinating with the ongoing Greater LA County IRWM Disadvantaged Community Involvement Program which conducted a water needs assessment across the County which will provide valuable knowledge and opportunity to integrate community-identified priorities into regional programs such as the Safe, Clean Water Program.



Overview

With support from EPA's Urban Waters Learning Network, we are pleased to offer two virtual workshops for LA Watershed Coordinators on water equity and anti-racism.



The SCWP emphasizes investments that produce benefits in or directly to disadvantaged communities. Complying with the Disadvantaged Community Benefit policy in the Program is complex, and asserting what benefits accrue to which communities is not easily quantified As of May 2021, the District Program is developing a study which, among many things, will review how other funding programs that direct investment in disadvantaged communities have worked to overcome the many challenges that remain when seeking to implement the SCWP policy. That study will inform future guidance, currently expected in the Spring of 2022, in support of Stormwater Investment Plan (SIP) development in the Regional Program for Year 4 (2022-23).

"'Disadvantaged Community (DAC) Benefit' means a Water Quality Benefit, Water Supply Benefit, and/or Community Investment Benefit located in a DAC or providing benefits directly to a DAC population." (Section 16.03(I))

"Water Quality Benefit" means a reduction in Stormwater or Urban Runoff pollution, such as improvements in the chemical, physical, and biological characteristics of Stormwater or Urban Runoff in the District. Activities resulting in this benefit include but are not limited to: infiltration or treatment of Stormwater or Urban Runoff, non-point source pollution control, and diversion of Stormwater or Urban Runoff to a sanitary sewer system. (Section 16.03(NN))

"Water Supply Benefit" means an increase in the amount of locally available water supply, provided there is a nexus to Stormwater or Urban Runoff capture. Activities resulting in this benefit include, but are not limited to, the following: reuse and conservation practices, diversion of Stormwater or Urban Runoff to a sanitary sewer system for direct or indirect water recycling, increased groundwater replenishment or available yield, or offset of potable water use. (Section 16.03(OO))


"Community Investment Benefit" means a benefit created in conjunction with a Project or Program, such as, but not limited to: improved flood management, flood conveyance, or flood risk mitigation; creation, enhancement or restoration of parks, habitat or wetlands; improved public access to waterways; enhanced or new recreational opportunities: and greening of schools. A Community Investment Benefit also includes a benefit to the community derived from a Project or Program that improves public health by reducing heat island effect and increasing shade or planting of trees or other vegetation that increase carbon reduction/sequestration and improve air quality. (Section 16.03(F))

Hi Brian, Jessica, Carlos, and Sofia,

Thank you for taking the time to meet with me on Thursday. I apologize if this is a little behind schedule, but I wanted to send you my thoughts on a funding request for the bikeway project. I went through and showed the sustainable elements on a worksheet (attached) that I think connect with potential funding. You will notice that the first 4 items shown were Clean California requests (3 items for bioretention swale and one line of 300 native trees). I added an additional line of native trees, which were not part of the Clean California request. The last two items are the estimates for the cost of putting chain link fencing and gates along the project path. I added this because I thought this had the potential for being swapped out with something that is more inviting and constructed with more sustainable materials.

My thoughts are this.

- 1 The Bioretention Swale is probably the easiest and best fit. The Clean California Grant is highly competitive and our project is not a 100% perfect fit for funding.
- 2- The Native Tree installation seems like another easy fit, but I am not sure if it would require any further input from ACOE, LACFCD, or others.
- 3 Sustainable Fencing elements: I chose this one to explore with you because it feels like it could be a promising area to upgrade to more sustainable materials and fit other elements better. My fear is that we already have a traditional AC pathway. If we couple this with an ugly chain link fence, then nobody is going to connect with the trees and bioswale. It's going to feel like a confused project. The estimate I included there is for the traditional fencing. I have not asked for any special funding for this, other than it is part of our current project plans and costs. Do you see the potential for bringing in funding to make this fencing match other sustainable elements in the project? I don't know what sustainable fencing would cost, but I am thinking that this is a good opportunity to bring in KDI to connect this section of the wash with other concepts that are in the works.

In terms of what might be available through the ULART group, the bioretention work is under \$1MM with contingencies and so is the fencing work. If these are a little too much in terms of costs, could we look at some partial contribution to either of those projects? Or would the \$156K for native tree installation be a better fit from a cost perspective? I don't want to over-ask here.



Hi Brian, Jessica, Carlos, and Sofia,

Thank you for taking the time to meet with me on Thursday. I apologize if this is a little behind schedule, but I wanted to send you my thoughts on a funding request for the bikeway project. I went through and showed the sustainable elements on a worksheet (attached) that I think connect with potential funding. You will notice that the first 4 items shown were Clean California requests (3 items for bioretention swale and

one line of 300 native trees). I added an additional line of native trees, which were not part of the Clean California request. The last two items are the estimates for the cost of putting chain link fencing and gates along the project path. I added this because I thought this had the potential for being swapped out with something that is more inviting and constructed with more sustainable materials.

My thoughts are this.

- 1 The Bioretention Swale is probably the easiest and best fit. The Clean California Grant is highly competitive and our project is not a 100% perfect fit for funding.
- 2- The Native Tree installation seems like another easy fit, but I am not sure if it would require any further input from ACOE, LACFCD, or others.
- 3 Sustainable Fencing elements: I chose this one to explore with you because it feels like it could be a promising area to upgrade to more sustainable materials and fit other elements better. My fear is that we already have a traditional AC pathway. If we couple this with an ugly chain link fence, then nobody is going to connect with the trees and bioswale. It's going to feel like a confused project. The estimate I included there is for the traditional fencing. I have not asked for any special funding for this, other than it is part of our current project plans and costs. Do you see the potential for bringing in funding to make this fencing match other sustainable elements in the project? I don't know what sustainable fencing would cost, but I am thinking that this is a good opportunity to bring in KDI to connect this section of the wash with other concepts that are in the works.

In terms of what might be available through the ULART group, the bioretention work is under \$1MM with contingencies and so is the fencing work. If these are a little too much in terms of costs, could we look at some partial contribution to either of those projects? Or would the \$156K for native tree installation be a better fit from a cost perspective? I don't want to over-ask here.
