A. Summary of Activities

Overview:

- 5. Continue to work with the MRCA on identifying potential projects and partnerships in the ULAR region.
- 6. Attend community events to facilitate outreach and engagement with residents and others.
- 7. Organize a tour of City of LA projects in the ULAR Watershed.
- 8. Develop a proposal to engage the business community on Measure W and the Safe, Clean Water Program issues through a public forum proposed to take place in June 2022.
- 9. Provide outreach and engagement support to the McCambridge Park Stormwater Capture Project in Burbank, California.

Quarterly Report 4 March 2022 - May 2022

A. Summary of Activities

Provide a high-level summary of activities completed this quarter and progress made toward completion of the annual scope of work.

During Quarter 4 (March 1, 2022 - May 31, 2022), the Watershed Coordinator Clarasophia Gust made progress toward activities in all 9 tasks.

In this quarter the Watershed Coordinator continued to focus on identifying and engaging target audiences across interested party groups and identifying community priorities of said groups. A total of 120 meetings were held or attended in this fourth quarter. On May 19th, the Watershed Coordinator helped host an online Schools & Stormwater Symposium with the Schools & Stormwater Watershed Coordinator Working Group (Heal the Bay, Melina Watts, TreePeople and Day One) with over 300 registrants and 200 attendees. This event generated multiple project opportunity inquiries following the event. The Watershed Coordinator and team tabled at three community events, one at Arbor Day, another at the SCOPE headquarters in Inglewood, and the 626 Street Event and Eco-Fair in the City of Alhambra to educate community members about the Safe Clean Water Program and learn about community priorities and project ideas. Likewise, the Watershed Coordinator attended a tour of Poppy Peak in Highland Park with community members to hear their project ideas and connect them into relevant resources. In addition, on May 26th, the Watershed Coordinator helped host a green streets water tour in the San Fernando Valley. The tour visited three sites and was co-organized with the City of LA Sanitation Dept, IRWM DACIP WaterTalks program and the watershed coordinator Adi Liberman and was attended by 10 non-profits and CBO's and 1 County agency. The Watershed Coordinator also had discussions with Sunland Tujunga Forward, Angelenos 4 Green Schools, RCSD SMM, BIASC, API Forward Movement, interested parties in South Pasadena, LA County Public Works, LAUSD, BIASC, Children & Nature Network, and a neighborhood councilmember, and collaborated on the planning of the Living Schoolyard Coalition's Convening on school greening scheduled for June 22nd. The Watershed Coordinator facilitated two workshops titled "WaterTalks Workshop #3: Stormwater Capture and the SCWP" and the "Lower San Gabriel River & Lower LA River Workshop 1: Integrated Watershed Management." These discussions resulted in identification of priorities, parallel efforts, community engagement opportunities, and project opportunities. During Quarter 4, meetings were held to further develop and prioritize project sketches for the IRWM DACIP process.

Another focus during this quarter was supporting the ULAR WASC in their final 22/23 Stormwater Investment Plan decision. The Watershed Coordinator actively supported and coordinated several Cost-Share Partnerships and Leverage Funding efforts including the Maywood Riverfront Park Prop 1 Grant application in Lower LA River and a State Water Infrastructure Budget Request Letter. In addition, the Watershed Coordinator participated in the successful allocation of \$5 million in Congressional Community Project Funding for improvements at the Pacoima Wash. \$5 million going to the Office of Los Angeles City Councilwoman Monica Rodriguez to build a new pedestrian and bicycle bridge along Telfair Avenue over the Pacoima Wash, which will provide safe and direct access to the future El Dorado Park. \$800,000 will also go to Pacoima Beautiful to implement the final phase of the Pacoima Wash Vision Plan, which creates a green space for the community. The Watershed Coordinator also continued to add to an interested parties database, event tracking, and grant tracking. Effort was placed in the conceptualizing and development of a Project Scenario Tool that could be used by the WASC during their SIP deliberation. Regional coordination also took place with other Watershed Coordinators through monthly meetings, workgroup meetings, and specific coordination with Lower LA River on the Maywood Riverfront Park.

At the March 2nd ULAR WASC meeting, the ULAR Watershed Coordination team gave a mid-year report presentation detailing what work has been done in the first 6 months and the work yet to come. At the April 6th ULAR WASC meeting, the Watershed Coordinator presented an online scenario mapping tool to aid the WASC in their SIP deliberation process. The tool displayed the geographic distribution of previously funded projects, current projects under consideration, their locations in relation to disadvantaged community census block groups, and a brief snapshot of project benefits. On April 13th, the Watershed Coordinator presented about the role and work accomplished regionally to date to the Safe, Clean Water Program Regional Oversight Committee in collaboration with the Day One Watershed Coordinator for the Upper San Gabriel River Watershed, Alfredo Camacho.

The Watershed Coordinator also continued to develop databases, tracking systems, and stakeholder/network lists for project proponents and contacts. During this quarter the CWH Watershed Coordination team developed an ArcGIS online scenario tool to support the ULAR WASC SIP deliberation and project prioritization process. Organized coordination continued between the City of LA Safe, Clean Water team and the Bowtie Demo Project team and Pacoima Wash Greenway teams individually to pursue gaining a letter of support from the City. The Watershed Coordinator also scheduled a meeting between the City of Glendale and community stakeholders to be held in June. Effort was also placed on coordination meetings with the ULAR watershed coordination team, including Environmental Outreach Strategies, and collaborating with the team on communications materials such as a newsletter and maintaining social media and online platforms including the ULAR Facebook Group and Twitter page.

Throughout the quarter the Watershed Coordinator worked in close collaboration with the other CWH Watershed Coordinator, Carlos Moran, as part of the CWH Watershed Coordination Team, and coordinated efforts with the third ULAR Watershed Coordinator with Environmental Outreach Strategies, Adi Liberman. Additionally, the Watershed Coordinator tracked and participated in parallel regional efforts including key committee meetings such as the City of LA SCWP Working Group, LA County Unincorporated Area SCWP project teams, IRWM DACIP project team, and regional watershed coordinator meetings in March, April, and May.






The Hydrologic Cycle in the Natural Landscape

Identifying Project Opportunities

Flooding

There are several locations on campus that currently experience flooding when it rains. These locations are indicated on the map to the right in blue.

Slopes of Concern

The steep hillside in the center of the school campus indicated in yellow are areas in which there is moderate concern over the stability of the hillside.

Debris Flow

There is one instance of debris flow occurring during storm events between the "slope of concern," the handball court, and trailer in the center of campus. The location is indicated in orange.

Garde

There was once a production garden in the center of the school campus. It was managed by a teacher who retired. During the COVID-19 pandemic, school staff restarted a garden in this same location.



Quarterly Report: Q4 March 2022 - May 2022

A. Summary of Activities

Provide a high-level summary of activities completed this quarter and progress made toward completion of the annual scope of work.

During Quarter 4 (March 1, 2022 - May 31, 2022), the Watershed Coordinator Carlos Moran made progress towards activities in all 9 tasks. In this quarter, the watershed coordinator continued to place emphasis on identifying and engaging target audiences across interested party groups and identifying community priorities of said groups. A total of 100+ meetings were held or attended in this fourth quarter. The Watershed Coordinator had discussions with City of LA and County Unincorporated Area SCWP project teams, City of San Fernando, Mountains Recreation & Conservation Authority, Bureau of Street Services, Sunland Tujunga Forward, Angelenos for Green Schools, Stillwater Sciences, City of LA Neighborhood Initiatives, Oakwood Sustainability Working Group, Greenlining, LAUSD, Sunland Tujunga Neighborhood Council, LA Ciclavia, and the IRWM DACIP project team among others. Meetings resulted in identification of priorities, parallel efforts, community engagement opportunities, cost share partnerships and project opportunities. Additionally, progress was made towards the Oakwood School Campus and two separate Pacoima Wash projects. Furthermore, progress was made toward securing SMMC as a cost-share partner on the Pacoima Wash Loop Activation Project and the Pacoima Wash Greenway Augmentation Project led by KDI and Pacoima Beautiful, and the City of San Fernando respectively. The coordinated effort resulted in a recommendation of funding by the SMMC Board. Both projects meet the goals of the SCWP. On May 19th, as part of the Schools & Stormwater Working Group, the Watershed Coordinator hosted a Schools & Stormwater Symposium on Zoom with over 200 attendees.

At the March 2nd ULAR WASC meeting, the ULAR Watershed Coordination team gave a mid-year report presentation detailing what work has been done in the first 6 months and the work yet to come. At the April 6th ULAR WASC meeting, the Watershed Coordinator presented an online scenario mapping tool to aid the WASC in their SIP deliberation process. The tool displayed the geographic distribution of previously funded projects, current projects under consideration, their locations in relation to disadvantaged community census block groups, and a brief snapshot of project benefits.

The Watershed Coordinator and team conducted outreach and education activities to educate community members about the Safe Clean Water Program and learn about community priorities and project ideas. The Watershed Coordinator and team tabled at three community events, one at Arbor Day, another at the SCOPE headquarters in Inglewood, and the 626 Street Event and Eco-Fair in the City of Alhambra. Outreach and education activities also included presenting at the Sunland Tujunga Neighborhood Council Town Hall with the IRWM DACIP WaterTalks program; co-sponsoring the South LA Transformative Climate Communities Grant Proposal Virtual Community Meeting; facilitating two workshops titled "WaterTalks Workshop #3: Stormwater Capture and the SCWP"; Facilitated the "Lower San Gabriel River & Lower LA River Workshop 1: Integrated Watershed Management" workshop; and presented at the "WaterTalks for Elected and Policymakers Workshop 1: Integrated Watershed Management: From Policy to Practice." Likewise, the watershed coordinator and team placed effort in preparing for and hosting the virtual event titled "Schools and Stormwater Symposium: A Multi-Benefit Opportunity" on May 18, as well as the in person water tour titled, "Water Project Tours: Green Streets & Green Alleys" on May 26. The first event was coordinated with the watershed coordinators who make up the Schools and Stormwater Working Group: Heal the Bay, Melina Watts, TreePeople and Day One. This event generated 300+ registrants and project opportunity inquiries post the event. The second event which toured three sites was co-organized with the City of LA Sanitation Dept, IRWM DACIP WaterTalks program and the watershed coordinator Adi Liberman and was attended by 10 non-profits and CBOs and one County agency.

Another focus during this quarter was supporting the ULAR WASC in their final 22/23 Stormwater Investment Plan decision. The Watershed Coordinator actively supported and coordinated several Cost-Share Partnerships and Leverage Funding efforts including the Maywood Riverfront Park Prop 1 Grant application in Lower LA River and a State Water Infrastructure Budget Request Letter. In addition, the Watershed Coordinator participated in the successful allocation of \$5 million in Congressional Community Project Funding for improvements at the Pacoima Wash. \$5 million going to the Office of Los Angeles City Councilwoman Monica Rodriguez to build a new pedestrian and bicycle bridge along Telfair Avenue over the Pacoima Wash, which will provide safe and direct access to the future El Dorado Park. \$800,000 will also go to Pacoima Beautiful to implement the final phase of the Pacoima Wash Vision Plan, which creates a green space for the community. The Watershed Coordinator also continued to add to an interested parties database, event tracking, and grant tracking. Effort was placed in the conceptualizing and development of a Project Scenario Tool that could be used by the WASC during their SIP deliberation. Regional coordination also took place with other Watershed Coordinators through monthly meetings, workgroup meetings, and specific coordination with Lower LA River on the Maywood Riverfront Park.

Throughout these activities the Watershed Coordinator worked in close collaboration with the other CWH Watershed Coordinator, Clarasophia Gust, as part of the CWH Watershed Coordination Team, and coordinated efforts with the third ULAR Watershed Coordinator with Environmental Outreach Strategies, Adi Liberman. Effort was also placed on coordination meetings with the ULAR watershed coordination team, including Environmental Outreach Strategies, and collaborating with the team on communications materials such as a newsletter and maintaining social media and online platforms including the ULAR Facebook Group and Twitter page.

Cárdenas Announces Over \$5 Million in Community Project Funding to the City of Los Angeles and Pacoima Beautiful for Pacoima Wash Improvements

SAN FERNANDO VALLEY – Today, **Congressman Tony Cárdenas (CA-29)** presented \$5.8 million in Community Project Funding checks to the **Office of Los Angeles City Councilwoman Monica Rodriguez** and **Pacoima Beautiful** for improvements to the Pacoima Wash.

"For years, our community has rallied around the hope and dream of improving the Pacoima Wash, and today, we are one step closer to making that a reality," **said Congressman Cárdenas.** "The over \$5 million in Community Project Funding we delivered will make the Pacoima Wash better and safer for our community. Thank you to Councilwoman Monica Rodriguez and Veronica Padilla for working tirelessly on these projects and helping us deliver for our friends and neighbors. Together, we will continue to build a more beautiful Pacoima for our community."

A \$5 million check was presented to the Office of Los Angeles City Councilwoman Monica Rodriguez to build a new pedestrian and bicycle <u>bridge</u> to provide safe and direct access to the future El Dorado Park. Currently, local students and neighborhood residents use a dangerous cut-through route that has caused numerous tragedies, including the most recent death of 14-year-old <u>Elias Rodriguez</u>.

"The Telfair Bridge is a reflection of years of work and collaboration that will bring a much needed project to the Pacoima community," **said Councilwoman Monica Rodriguez.** "This bridge will unite a community currently divided by manmade infrastructure and will create a safe passage for members of the community to cross the Pacoima wash. Thanks to the advocacy of Congressman Tony Cárdenas, we now have the funding needed to begin construction on this multimodal bridge crossing at Telfair."

In addition, a \$800,000 check was presented to Pacoima Beautiful to support the first phase of the <u>Pacoima Wash Vision Plan</u> that goes from the 5 freeway to Haddon Street, eventually extending to San Fernando Road. The funding will support the creation of a multipurpose park and green space that will help create a healthier, more sustainable community.

A big thank you to Congressman Cardenas for allocating this funding for the Pacoima Wash, thank you for believing in our vision and prioritizing our community that deserves to see beautiful parks and amenities just like other neighborhoods in Los Angeles County."

For the first time since 2009, Congress passed Community Project Funding, money requested by Members of Congress to meet the needs of their district. Congressman Cárdenas submitted ten Community Project Funding requests to the Appropriations Committee, all of which were passed in the Fiscal Year 2022 appropriations federal funding package. The over \$12 million going to the Northeast San Fernando Valley will support community improvement, housing for the homeless, job training, youth programs, mental health services and more.






The Hydrologic Cycle in the Natural Landscape



3. Public Comment

Declan Floyd, a representative from the Office of Senator Anthony Portantino, gave a public comment in support of Item 15. Floyd stated Senator Portantino supports the Item 15 \$2.6 million grant to Angeles National Forest for its important efforts in reducing wildfire fuel and invasive species as well as building resilience against our now-eternal fire season. Floyd stated Angeles National Forest sits mostly within the 25th State Senate District, and Senator Portantino is proud to represent and protect this large forest area that is critical to our sustainability and the natural

beauty of California. Floyd added this is not only important for sustainability efforts against climate change but protecting the natural beauty of the state and providing everyone with access to these open spaces.

8. Executive Officer's Report

a. Legislative

Salian Garcia gave a brief report regarding two bills: AB2897 (O'Donnell D) and SB1122 (Allen D). Garcia stated not much movement has occurred with AB2897, but SB1122 is up for hearing in the senate on Thursday (May 19, 2022) to see if it will move away from appropriations on to the board. Mark Stanley added AB2897 was an update to other sessions and it does not look like the bill will move at all in the current session

Melissa Bahmanpour provided an update on May revise. Bahmanpour stated the Governor has stated the California multi-year climate investment is at \$47.1 billion, which is a few billion higher than the nation's. In the area of water, Bahmanpour stated in addition to \$5.2 billion investments in our water systems last year (2021), the governor's proposed budget had \$750 million from the general fund. Bahmanpour stated the May revise had \$1.3 million from the general fund which includes\$ 530 million to support water cleanup and \$550 million for urban and small community water systems. Bahmanpour stated areas of extreme heat had the 2021 budget act with \$800 million from the general fund, but the May revise had a proposed allocation of \$300 million with \$220 million over two years to support cooling of communities at schools and \$43 mill to protect vulnerable populations and heat resistance through codes, standards, and regulations. Bahmanpour stated in areas of nature-based solutions, the 2021 budget act committed \$1.4 million from the general fund over three years for multi-benefit naturebased solutions with a proposed allocation of \$768 million over two years and a one time \$18.3 million allocation from the general fund. Bahmanpour there is a proposed \$120 million for two programs.

In the realm of energy, Bahmanpour added the state's energy transition requires growth in infrastructure which creates a system that should be clean, reliable, and affordable. Bahmanpour stated the governor's plan included \$2 billion for clean energy investments and the May revise includes an additional \$8 billion investment. Bahmanpour noted a proposed tax which would go to sea restoration. Mark Stanley added updates will be

brought back to the Board. Stanley highlighted The Protecting America's Wilderness and Public Lands Act (H.R. 803) which is championed in California by Reps. Carbajal, Chu, Huffman, and Schiff, and will protect one million acres of public land and more than 500 miles of rivers in the San Gabriel Mountains, the Santa Monica Mountains, the Central Coast and Northwest California, in addition to public lands and rivers in Arizona, Colorado, and Washington. Stanley stated the act does include a portion of the Outdoor for All act which has benefits to urban and low-income areas.

b. Capital Outlay & Support Budget

c. Salian Garcia provided a Capital Outlay & Support Budget report which includes information on the RMC's revenue and expenditures from local assistance, capital outlay, and Budget Act allocations for the Lower Los Angeles River and Early Action Budget Wildfire Resilience Funding (Wildfire Grant Program SB85). Garcia stated the Capital Outlay report contains information on the total local assistance and capital outlay funds appropriated, encumbered, and remaining from active funding sources. For a detailed report on each approved grant and associated fund source, please refer to agenda Item 7C Cumulative Grant Project Status Summary. This report reflects balances as of April 30, 2022. Garcia stated projects pending Board approval total \$3.7 million, encumbered/ expended totals just over \$36 million, and the total available for encumbrance/ expenditure is \$154 million. Garcia noted that with the upcoming budget act, there will be additional appropriations from Prop 68. Garcia stated next year's numbers will include those numbers. Garcia referenced projects previously approved by the Board and stated they are expected to be concluded by the end of the fiscal year. Exhibit A on the Board report includes the Support and Operations Budget for Fiscal Year2021/2022. We are about 83% through the Fiscal Year; however, spending looks low due to telework. However, as things continue to pick up, such as travel, printing, and IT services, increase. We are on track to still stay below our projected budget. Garcia stated there are two grantees that have received advanced funds under Exhibit B; however, these are expected to be reconciled within 30 days. Exhibit C showed the Contract Report.

d. Cumulative Grant Project Status Summary

Salian Garcia stated the Cumulative Grant Project Status Summary report reflects projects with activity during the current fiscal year, including those that were approved, certified, completed or withdrawn. Each project is identified by funding source (Proposition1, 40, 50, 68, and 84; and General Fund including SB 85 Wildfire Resilience Program); project name; applicant name; grant amount; and the project status. The report is sorted by grant number. The status section for each grant has been updated to provide additional detail on the grantees' current activities and progress toward project completion. It also reflects any recent updates from projects completed in previous fiscal years. Since 2003, the RMC has authorized 305 total projects, which consist of 224 completed projects, 58 are certified, 8 approved and awaiting encumbrance, and with the remaining balance of 15 withdrawn projects. The total number of projects excludes any potential projects that are awaiting board approval

e. Project and Liaison Activities

Suely Saro provided an update on the River Ranger Program. Saro stated the program had a kick-off celebration April 30, 2022 with Assemblymember Cristina Garcia which Saro stated was successful. Saro provided an additional update on the Lower Los Angeles River Recreation and Park District which she stated is moving forward subtly. Saro stated they need to submit the boundary to the state board which may take longer as they may need to bring on a surveyor. Saro stated B268 was signed by Governor Newsom and it extends the deadline to establish the Lower San Gabriel River Recreation and Park District. It extends the deadline to submit the petition or resolution establishing the district from January 1, 2020, to January 1, 2024. Saro stated there is interest from the City of Pico Rivera to be the lead applicant for the parks district, and they are in discussion. Saro referenced the Lower Los Angeles River Revitalization Plan (AB530)- Implementation Advisory Group (IAG) and added they would be meeting in June 2022.

Blair Crossman provided an update on the Wildfire Prevention Grant Program. Crossman stated over \$8 million of the Early Action Wildfire funds have been awarded throughout the Angeles National Forest and in the Puente Hills corridor. More than half the projects will support workforce development through multi-year partnerships with the California and local conservation corps. Crossman stated RMC was appropriated another \$15 million through the General Fund in the Wildfire and Forest Resilience package of the Budget Act of 2021 (Sec. 68 Item 3825-102-0001). In addition to wildfire prevention and resiliency projects, the funding is focused on supporting the goals of California's Wildfire and Forest Resilience Action Plan: A Comprehensive Strategy. Crossman stated the RMC Wildfire Prevention Grant Program is needed to reduce fire risk in advance of upcoming fire seasons and staff will work with partner organizations to award funding from this program in coming months. Crossman stated the last San Gabriel Mountain Community Collaborative (SGMCC) meeting was held March 24, 2022. Crossman explained the collaborative was introduced to acting Angeles National Forest Supervisor Tom Torres, members expressed interest in starting a new Ad Hoc Committee focused on ecological resilience, a new working group will focus on planning optional field trips, the Visitor Reception Planning working group working with ANF Forest Service to adopt a visitorcentric approach to visitor reception planning process, and actively working on securing funds for planning efforts, RMC provided an update on new Non-Bond Priorities Grant Programs, and Trail Stewardship Training scheduled for 5/20/22 to 5/22/22. The next SGMCC meeting is scheduled for May 26, 2022.

Crossman also gave an update on the Urban Orchard Project. Crossman stated grading activities are on-going. Crossman stated the base material for the parking lot has been installed. Lighting and electrical work for light fixtures is on-going. Crossman added we are close to finishing the review of submittals for the educational center.

Crossman gave an update on the River Environmental Flows Study Supplemental Analysis (RMC 18013). Crossman stated the Southern California Coastal Water Research Project (SCCWRP) has submitted the Los Angeles River Environmental Flows Project and Management Targets to the State Water Board and presented the study to the Regional Water Quality Control Board. WCA and MRCA have been working with Stillwater Sciences to define appropriate uses and limitations of the SCCWRP Flows Study, and to provide guidance in future decision making that may threaten to reduce instream flows. Crossman stated Heal the Bay's Lower Los Angeles River Stream team has participated in compiling

Lower LAR data and analysis to the Annual River Report card the first time the Lower LAR is represented in this regionally important document. Crossman stated WCA worked on permitting through Flood Control District for a rental agreement to place digital temperature loggers in the LAR channel, providing Decontamination Plan, revising maps, providing insurance documentation. Board Member Donnelly asked if the \$8 million was from grants RMC has given out. Crossman stated yes, about \$8.7 million was funded by RMC.

Arturo Gonzalez provided an update on the Community Center at DeForest Park (RMC 18012). Gonzalez stated the year started off well with all permits for the vertical construction in place (City decided to separately issue demo/grading vs. new building construction) and the building began to be constructed in earnest. Gonzalez stated due to the timing of some (much needed) rain events at the beginning of the year, the soil had to be retested for moisture content to ensure it was safe to lay down the concrete pad. With the final approval in place for the pad, the foundation was laid and the building started to take shape. Gonzalez stated all inspections were passed as it relates to pressure testing of the foundation. Gonzalez added, as has been the case with all of the supply chain issues in the construction industry, a lot of work was done to coordinate getting materials on site and press forward despite the lack of availability of certain materials. Gonzalez stated the metal columns were installed and anchored to the foundation followed by the start of the framing going up. In order to bring about positive changes to DeForest Park in North Long Beach, its wetlands, and the greater LLAR Region, the Conservation of Long Beach (CCLB) will develop a master plan for the entire DeForest Park, as well as design and install a satellite site at the DeForest Wetlands to better serve the needs of the LLAR while training youth as river stewards. By implementing a satellite site, CCLB will not only be able to oversee the master plan as it is carried out, but more importantly, have the resources to carry out necessary functions to sustain the health and vitality of the LLAR and its surrounding communities in the long term. Gonzalez stated during construction, the satellite site will function as a Lower LA River restoration center and crew training location.

Sally Gee gave an update on the Long Beach Municipal Urban Stormwater Treatment (LB_MUST) Project (RMC 17009). Gee stated the city has awarded a construction contract to the wetlands construction portion of the project. Gee stated the notice is to proceed as anticipated. Gee showed pictures from the Canyon Country Community Center Regional Infiltration Project (RMC 19003) and stated staff could see the water treatment and infiltration systems that were installed. Gee gave an additional update on the Lower LA River Restoration and Access Grant (RMC 20007) project led by Trout Unlimited. Gee stated the project team has completed the existing conditions report and is currently soliciting feedback on concept design alternatives for fish passage, public education, vegetation type, access and recreation. Public outreach remains ongoing, and Hydraulic Modeling for the design alternatives are being completed

Joe Gonzalez highlighted Watershed Conservation Authority Activities and gave an update on River Park (RMC 3609/ 18002). Gonzalez stated work is continuing on the project through 100% construction. Gonzalez added WCA staff has also been working with County Parks and Recreation to advance lease language for presentation to the LA County Board of Supervisors in June to secure approvals and prepare budget for FY2022—

2023. Gonzalez stated in March, the Design Team presented its final conceptual plans. The team has also begun work on the Construction Document (CD) package and has been reaching out to permitting agencies. CEQA documents were also reviewed and it was determined that plans for the Center are within the parameters of the existing CEQA. Gonzalez stated in April, WCA staff met with stakeholder groups to discuss the project and ask for feedback.

Gonzalez provided an update on the Emerald Necklace. Gonzalez stated the stakeholder team met on May 5, 2022 and they need to continue to discuss moving forward projects identified. Gonzalez added they specifically are discussing the 15 projects identified by the implementation plan. Gonzalez stated the county is leading the effort for several of these projects and are seeking additional funding. Gonzalez stated the county is working with TPL to talk to the City of Arcadia about negotiations on acquisition. Gonzalez added the Department of Parks and Recreation is also leading a project at Peck Park for a trailhead connection. Gonzalez stated the county is helping to lead trail development for River Park. Gonzalez highlighted projects 13 and 15 which are still ongoing.

Mark Stanley stated the monthly RMC Newsletter goes out to an extensive mailing list, and Board Members can be asked to added to the list.

f. COVID-19 Updates

Mark Stanley stated there is nothing specific to report regarding Covid-19. Stanley stated moving forward meetings will be held in-person and hybrid. Stanley stated the next Board Meeting (June 20, 2022) will be in Bellflower, and July's meeting will be held in Rosemead. Stanley noted the June Board Meeting is an additional meeting to pass budget items.

11. Consideration of a resolution authorizing the establishment of an Interagency Agreement between the San Gabriel and Lower Los Angeles Rivers and Mountains Conservancy and the

Wildlife Conservation Board for the West Coyote Hills, Phase II Acquisition, Appraisal and Due Diligence

Sally Gee stated staff recommends the RMC Board authorize the establishment of an Interagency Agreement between the San Gabriel and Lower Los Angeles Rivers and Mountains Conservancy and the Wildlife Conservation Board for the West Coyote Hills, Phase II Acquisition, Appraisal and Due Diligence. Gee stated in the Budget Act of 2021, \$1 million was allocated in General Funds to the Wildlife Conservation Board (WCB)for conducting an independent appraisal of the parcel known and referred to as the West Coyote Hills (WCH) property in northern Orange County (Exhibit A). Gee noted preserving the WCH would offer unique biological benefits. Gee stated on May26, 2022, the WCB Governing Board will consider an interagency agreement (IAA)between the RMC and WCB to allocate funds from the Budget Act of 2021 to RMC to complete an appraisal and due diligence activities for the WCH Phase II Acquisition. RMC, as the local agency, would take lead on the project to contract an appraiser, and coordinate with the City of Fullerton, Chevron (property owner) and other agencies to advance the purpose of the legislation. Other interested agencies include, but are not limited to, the WCB, State Coastal Conservancy, and the US Fish and Wildlife Service. This funding would only support the completion of an appraisal and related due diligence activities. Additional funding would need to be secured for acquisition of the property

Ali Saleh motioned to approve this item. Gary Boyer seconded the motion. Unanimously approved. Roll call vote – Ayes = 9; Nays = 0; Abstentions = 0.

12. Consideration of a resolution approving a grant to the Los Angeles Neighborhood Land Trust for the Maywood Riverfront Park Renovation and Development Project

1. Arturo Gonzalez stated staff recommends that the RMC Board authorize approval of a Proposition 1 grant in the amount of \$2,207,370 to the Los Angeles Neighborhood Land Trust (LANLT) for the Maywood Riverfront Park Renovation and Development Project in the City of Maywood for a performance period from July 1, 2022 through June 30, 2024. Gonzalez stated the Maywood Riverfront Park Renovation and Development project will significantly upgrade a heavily used 5acre park in one of the most park poor and dense communities in Southern California. Gonzalez stated the park is also located near the starting point of the Lower LA River Bike Trail and serves as a popular entryway for bicyclists and residents along the LA River. Gonzalez stated because the park was built on a toxic superfund site, environmental remediation required a phased build out, leaving one half of the park heavily degraded from constant use while the newer portion of the park on the southeast side has less amenities and illicit activity frequently occurs. Gonzalez stated community-based planning efforts by East Yard Communities for Environmental Justice (EYCEJ) and Communities for a Better Environment (CBE) since 2019 have created priority park upgrades and concept designs. While the project includes enhancement to park amenities, the RMC elements will add drought tolerant southern California native plantings and expanded river adjacent natural habitat, over two dozen new shade trees and enhanced water capture features including swales and 2 permeable pavement. Gonzalez stated other features include educational and interpretive signage highlighting the LA River Watershed, community, and cultural history of the area. If approved by the board, this project will have a timeline of 2 years from July 1, 2022 to an anticipated completion by June 30, 2024. Gonzalez noted the project scored 85%, and staff recommends funding the project.

Gonzalez stated Maywood is an extremely dense and heavily urbanized city located less than 5 miles southeast of Downtown Los Angeles. With a population density of over 22,000 people per square mile, Gonzalez stated the mostly Latino community (97%) neighbors the industrial city of Vernon and the 710 freeway, creating significant environmental justice issues faced by residents. Gonzalez stated Maywood is extremely park poor, with .26 acres of park space per 1000 residents, one of the lowest in the nation. Gonzalez stated Riverfront Park is the largest park in the city and contains the only basketball and informal soccer fields in the area. Gonzalez stated the community experiences higher than average rates of obesity and chronic health issues and scores in the 97th percentile according to Cal Enviroscreen. Gonzalez stated complimentary community led park upgrades include new ADA accessible playground areas, waterplay elements, restroom upgrades, new grassy areas that double as community meeting spaces, larger picnic spaces, more formal soccer fields, art elements, exercise equipment and a large memorial to Sleepy Lagoon and Tongva culture. Gonzalez stated this grant award to the LA Neighborhood Land Trust for the Maywood Riverfront Park Renovation Project is for a total amount of \$2,207,370 in Proposition 1 funds. The project has a total budget of over \$11.6million; with \$4.45 million in Measure W funding awarded from LA County, a \$2,145,000 California State 4 budget allocation, \$952,500 of Measure A funding awarded by LA County RPOSD, and \$194,000 of funding awarded by State Parks. See Exhibit B: Budget for additional project details

Tori Kjer, Executive Director from LA Neighborhood Land Trust, gave a brief presentation for the project. Kjer stated the Land Trust is an advocacy and development nonprofit. Kjer showed the project vicinity map and stated the project is a significant park for the city. Kjer stated the project is part of a larger, 2-year planning and community engagement process. Kjer stated the community identified the site as a priority. Kjer stated elements included in the project come from the community. Kjer stated RMC and other agencies were involved in the acquisition of the park 15 years ago. Kjer showed various design elements that the space does not currently have. Kjer added they will include multiple stormwater measures which would include a diversion to a sanitary sewer. Kjer noted other sustainable elements include native plants placed in the correct places. Kjer showed the project budget and funding sources and project timeline.

Board Member Saleh noted the proposed budget says \$3.8 million of funding is recommended and asked where the \$2.2 million request comes from. Kjer stated they are currently working on the Measure W application which is about \$5 million and is expected in July. Kjer noted project elements may be phased in or out depending on budget allocations. Kjer stated a large portion of the project can be completed with various funding sources. Saleh asked staff why the proposed budget was originally \$3.8 million. Mark Stanley noted the reduction is because RMC is only funding natural elements and other elements were out of the scope of RMC's mission. Stanley stated other funding partners are funding other elements. Board Members Saleh and Diaz voiced their support for the project. Diaz noted the area needs a lot of care.

<u>Vincent Chang motioned to approve this item. Ali Saleh seconded the motion. Unanimously approved.</u> Roll call vote – Ayes = 9; Nays = 0; Abstentions = 0.

13. Consideration of a resolution approving a grant to the Los Angeles Neighborhood Land Trust for the Watts Towers Campus Renovation and Development Project

Arturo Gonzalez stated staff recommends that the RMC Board authorize approval of a Proposition 1 grant in the amount of \$1,860,000 to the Los Angeles Neighborhood Land Trust (LANLT) for Watts Towers Campus Renovation and Development project in the City of Los Angeles for a performance period of July 1, 2022 to June 30, 2024. Gonzalez stated the Watts Towers Campus Renovation and Development project will transform 2.96 acres of underdeveloped open space surrounding the historic public art monument, creating a community focal point at a location that receives over 40,000 visitors annually. Gonzalez stated the project will enhance an outdated campus prone to flooding and extend the park into an adjacent 0.69-acre empty lot along Santa Ana Boulevard in the heart of Watts, an extremely dense and park poor community in South Los Angeles that scores in the Cal EnviroScreen 100th percentile. Gonzalez stated the overall goal of the project is to turn the Watts Towers Art Center Campus into a green multi-benefit park with significant improvements in storm water management, southern California native landscape and natural resource oriented educational passive public amenities. Gonzalez stated the project scored 86% and staff recommends funding the project

Gonzalez stated this grant award to the LA Neighborhood Land Trust for the Watts Towers Campus Renovation and Development Project for a total amount of\$1,860,000in Proposition 1 funds. The project has a total budget of over \$8.9 million; with \$4.2 million in Prop 68 funding awarded from California State Parks, \$750,000 in Prop K funding from the City of LA, \$400,000 in SGC TCC funding from the State of California, \$780,000 in Measure A funding from LA County, and a pending \$1.3 million Urban Greening grant from the State of California. See Exhibit B: Budget for additional project details.

Tori Kjer showed the project vicinity map and stated it is based around the WATTS tower, a historic monument. Kjer noted the site is in an extremely dense and park poor community. Kjer stated she has worked on the project for over a decade. Kjer stated the site is significantly run down, and the infrastructure it has is worn out. Kjer stated current funding is focused on one portion of the site. Kjer stated the area would have interactive features for art space. Kjer stated most of the ecological features are for stormwater capture. Kjer added there is a big focus on native plants and introducing the community to nature. Kjer showed the project budget and noted art elements are a big portion of the budget because this is an arts and culture campus. Kjer stated planning will begin in the summer 2022.

<u>Denis Bertone motioned to approve this item. Denise Diaz seconded the motion. Unanimously approved.</u> Roll call vote – Ayes = 9; Nays = 0; Abstentions = 0.

14. Consideration of a resolution approving a grant to the City of South Gate for the Circle Park Development Project

Arturo Gonzalez stated staff recommends that the RMC Board authorize approval of a Proposition 1 grant in the amount of \$2,000,000 to the City of South Gate for the Circle Park Development Project in the City of South Gate for a performance period from July 1, 2022 through November 30, 2023. Gonzalez stated Circle Park is a 4.5-acre open space located adjacent to the Rio Hondo River just north of the confluence with the LA River, in the Hollydale district of South Gate. Gonzalez stated the park has remained underdeveloped because it sits along SCE transmission line right of way and also required additional project funds. Gonzalez stated the location of the site has led to problems with crime and unhoused encampments which have been noted by local

residents at various community meetings and calls to civic officials. The City of South Gate will attempt to turn those geographic constraints into opportunities by including a 1/3rdmile long walking path that is ADA accessible and improve directional connections to the Rio Hondo Bike Path. The project will prioritize water capture elements and other best management practices in a sustainable design that compliments the adjacent river flows. Additional elements include interpretive and educational signage about the watershed and native/migratory birds, LED lighting and safety fences, open lawn space, native plantings and riverbank habitat restoration, new picnic areas, benches and water fountains, bicycle racks and a bicycle repair station. Gonzalez stated if approved by the board, this project will have a timeline of 2 years from July 1, 2022 to an anticipated completion by November 30, 2023. Gonzalez stated the project scored 90.166 out of 100, and staff recommends funding the project.

Steve Costley, Director of Parks and Recreation at City of South Gate, showed the project vicinity map. Costley noted there are a lot of elements in the area that RMC is helping to fund. Costley stated they had eight different community meetings and then drew construction documents. Costley noted the budget includes funding from various sources. Costley stated the site could be a connection point for the LA River.

<u>Vincent Chang motioned to approve this item. Denis Bertone seconded the motion.</u>
Unanimously approved. Roll call vote – Ayes = 9; Nays = 0; Abstentions = 0.

15. Consideration of a resolution approving a grant to the City of Bellflower for the Simms Park Stormwater Capture Project

Joseph Gonzalez stated staff recommends that the Board approve a grant in the amount of \$734,000 to the City of Bellflower for the Simms Park Stormwater Capture Project for a performance period from July 1, 2022 through April 21, 2024. Gonzalez stated the project will provide significant water quality benefits within the Los Cerritos Channel sub-watershed. The park is owned and operated by the City of Bellflower. Gonzalez stated RMC's funding focuses on the nature-based components within the parking lot, which will create 1.04 acres of native plantings, natural filtration bioswales, and permeable pavement areas. Gonzalez stated serves a large community adjacent to the 91 freeway and neighboring cities. Gonzalez stated the project scored 80% and if approved, would award Prop 1 funds

Bernardo Iniguez, Public Works Manager at City of Bellflower, and Oliver Galang, Professional Engineer from Craftwater Engineering, provided a brief presentation on the project. Iniguez stated they are well underway in the design and ready to hit the ground running. Galang stated the drainage area is 758 acres. Galang noted the project components and stated the components funded by RMC would include elements, such as permeable pavement and bioswales. Galang stated the water would eventually go to the Los Cerritos Wetlands. Galang showed the project budget which includes city and local funds. Galang stated the project would speed up portions, such as the parking lot and native landscaping areas, so that they will meet deadlines.

<u>Denis Bertone motioned to approve this item. Gary Boyer seconded the motion. Unanimously approved.</u> Roll call vote – Ayes = 9; Nays = 0; Abstentions = 0.

16. Consideration of a resolution approving expenditures of General Funds from the Wildfire Prevention Early Budget Action Plan for the Angeles National Forest Hazardous Fuels Reduction and Capacity Building Project

Blair Crossman stated staff recommends that the Board award a grant of Wildfire Prevention funds not to exceed \$2,613,000 to the Angeles National Forest for the Fuels Reduction and Capacity Building on the Angeles National Forest project. Crossman stated the proposed project is located in several sites throughout the central and eastern portions of the forest within RMC's jurisdiction. If approved, the project would fund four fuels reduction projects and an invasive veldtgrass removal. Crossman stated these projects combined cover more than 1,200 acres of territory within the ANF (see Exhibit A), including high-priority areas near campsites and recreation areas in order to protect these public resources from the threat of wildfire. Crossman added that in addition to the project work, this grant would fund the acquisition of equipment that is necessary to safely and effectively carryout fuels reduction projects, such as portable water tanks and woodchipper. Crossman noted approximately \$2 million of RMC funding would go towards implementation and \$600,000 towards equipment purchases. The equipment will be made available to existing and future Forest Service partners, such as local agencies and nonprofits that contribute to wildfire reduction. If approved, this grant would completely expend the remaining \$3.6 million in the Early Action Wildfire Fund.

Heather Noel, deputy forest supervisor for Angeles National Forest, provided a brief project presentation. Board Member Tom Torres stated the proposed project is in strong alignment with work to implement the California Wildfire and Forest Resilience Action Plan. Torres noted the project also aligns with the Forest Services' 10-year Wildfire Crisis Strategy. Torres stated the proposal is focused on implementation to build the capacity to do the work internally and with partners, via private contractors, and would implement needed work with partners. Torres noted the work outlined complements ongoing work funded federally and through RMC. Noel showed pictures of work done. Noel stated this request would help Forest Services meet the increased demand to accomplish more fuel projects on public lands. Noel stated projects will be completed on land where the public recreates. Noel noted new users are in the forest due to Covid-19 and Forest Services is working to meet them where they are and keep the public safe. Noel stated the project would begin September 2022.

Vice Chair Arrighi noted that when Forest Services acquires the water buffalo, it needs to be NSF 61 approved to carry potable water. Board Member Donnelly asked who would own the equipment and who it would be owned by. Noel stated the equipment would be owned and maintained by the Forest Services. Noel added the equipment would not be a onetime use. Board Member Martin asked if the equipment would leave the state and be a benefit to other states. Noel stated there should not be a reason the equipment leaves California as it would be maintained by the Angeles National Forest. Vice Chair Arrighi asked if the equipment would be moved out of County. Diane Travis, Fuels Planner from the National Forest Services, stated the primary concern with the equipment is that it is available for work. Travis added they would like to park the equipment on the Angeles National Forest and use it for fuels reduction. Donnelly asked if RMC could use the equipment for other projects in the future if it is not in use. Travis stated the equipment is intended to be available for partners within the territory.

RE: Support \$1.5 Billion in Water Project Funds for Drought Resilience, Water Quality, Economic Stability

Dear Governor Newsom, Senate pro Tempore Atkins, Assembly Speaker Rendon, and Chairs Skinner and Ting:

We, the undersigned, represent diverse advocates with shared values for an equitable water future: the human right to clean, safe, and affordable water (especially for low-income communities); resilient water infrastructure; good jobs performed by a skilled and trained workforce; healthy waterways, coastlines, rivers and freshwater ecosystems; robust community and tribal engagement, and the health of all people.

To confront the ongoing drought crisis, we seek a \$1.5 billion allocation in this year's State Budget for long-term climate resilient water investments in Southern California for large-scale wastewater recycling, stormwater capture, groundwater remediation projects, and continued improvements in water efficiency. Together, these projects will reduce competition over dwindling resources – improving water access for all Californians – and create thousands of good jobs, if covered by enforceable labor standards. This allocation could go towards funding programs for these types of projects, or be appropriated towards specific projects, such as the Metropolitan Water District's much-needed Regional Recycled Water Program (which alone could provide water for 500,000 households). These investments can also help alleviate budget issues related to the Gann limit as exempt capital outlay expenditures.

This February and March were the driest on record, threatening people and ecosystems alike. Water agencies throughout the state are receiving only 5% of expected imported supplies from the State Water Project. To address this crisis, we must overhaul our water systems to reduce waste and capture and use local supplies. We have an abundance of opportunities to do this. For example, LA County imports about 60% of the 500 billion gallons of water used per year, yet flushes an estimated 300 billion gallons of stormwater, runoff, and wastewater into the ocean every year. The Pacific Institute's recent report emphasizes opportunities from wastewater recycling and stormwater capture as crucial for the South Coast Region, and shows California could reduce urban water use by 30%-48% through efficiency investments.¹

The solution is clear: invest in infrastructure projects that recycle water that we have used, capture stormwater for beneficial use, maximize efficient use, and make sure that our groundwater is safe to drink. Last year, local

agencies proposed more than \$12 billion in projects to do just that, and received about 10% of the funding needed from existing programs. Much more is needed to confront the scale of the problem than is currently outlined in this year's budget. As CalEPA Secretary Blumenfeld said, "water scarcity is the new normal...and how we treat this precious resource has to be baked into everything that we do."

Investments in Southern California will relieve pressure on all of California and the Western United States by increasing the region's independence from increasingly scarce water sources upon which others depend. These investments can and should support other priorities, including equitable access to safe and affordable water for vulnerable communities; tribal-led restoration and conservation efforts, rights, and access to waterways; and urban, river, and ecosystem benefits from nature-based solutions. Investments can also support high-road construction careers if covered by enforceable labor standards, such as skilled and trained standards or Project Labor Agreements. A \$1.5 billion investment would create approximately 9,000 direct construction job-years, at a time when our communities need access to good jobs with benefits.

This commitment will help safeguard water supply and affordability; enjoy widespread support from jurisdictions, labor, community, and environmental advocates; reduce impacts on source areas for imported water supplies; and encourage a more climate-resilient Southern California that prioritizes equity, community and indigenous engagement and leadership, and good quality union jobs.
